The Cumberland County Board of Education met in a regular session on Thursday, December 2, 2021, in the Central Services Board Room, where the meeting was called to order by Chairman Inman at the approximate hour of 6:00pm. Inman advised, I would like to welcome all of our visitors. Thank you all for being here and I see that Mrs. Julia Timson is back with us this month. Mrs. Timson, do you have anything you want to share with us? Timson replied, I am delighted to know that we had so many great reports across our county for our TN Ready Testing and I just want to thank Dr. Maxwell, because if it was not for good leadership, letting teachers teach we couldn't get that done. So I do appreciate that. I also do want to stress and I know the board probably heard many, many times we have got to have those drivers and substitutes. We have got to. We're really doubling up a lot. Teachers are having to cover classes quite a bit and I know it is a problem everywhere and I know there is nothing you can do tonight, but I just wanted to bring it up once again. If anybody in the public is listening right now and you would like to substitute or drive a bus, please come help us. I promise we will treat you as good as we can. We will do whatever we can for you, but it is really getting to be a dire situation and we do have to do something. Safdie asked, what do you think besides COVID issue, are there any other issues that? Timson replied, I think pay is one thing. Safdie replied, pay. Boston asked, for subs and bus drivers? Karge asked, if I may? When I was subbing for the district it was less than a teenage babysitter would get per hour. That will give you an idea. Inman advised, over the years the board has increased the amount for substitutes. Now, can it go up? Absolutely and for bus drivers the same, but yes. If there is anybody out there that wants to substitute or wants to drive a school bus please contact us as soon as possible. This is a nationwide problem. It's just not right here in Cumberland County. It is nationwide. Boston asked, do you think if we reviewed and increased the pay for subs and bus drivers, do you think that would encourage? Timson replied, I believe it would. I mean, I really do believe it would. Karge advised, I think the issue is that people don't know how easy it actually is and how rewarding it is. So, they train you. It was some of the most fun I'd had when I was substituting. Maxwell asked, if I may? The good news is we did have substitute training yesterday and we had 9 people show up. There was almost 40 people that had called and asked to be trained and what we needed to do. 9 of them came, which is good. So we have 9 new names to add to the list. That is not nearly enough, but a little ray of hope. Boston asked, how many people are on the substitute list that we utilize and that is information you wouldn't? Maxwell replied, hundreds, there really are hundreds of people on there. Boston asked, we use that many subs? Timson advised, we only have 6 that come or that will answer to come. Boston asked, that only want to come to North? Timson replied, yes. Hamby advised, we have a lot on the list, but they don't all answer their call or are able to come. Safdie asked, I love this discussion and I apologize. Perhaps we should officially talk about it in other business. Hamby advised, in other business. Safdie asked, is that a good idea? Inman replied, we could do that or on the agenda we also have the board retreat. We could also discuss it in the board retreat. Safdie replied, that would be a good idea. That is just a month in a half away. Inman advised, yes. This is something we need to be discussing and we will be bringing it up.

9. Community Comments - Inman advised, next item is the Community Comments. Mrs. Diane I don't think anybody signed up for Community Comments. Diane shook her head no. Inman replied, so we will move on.

10. Acknowledgement of Elected Officials - Inman advised, Acknowledgement of Elected Officials. I don't see any, but if there is anybody out there let me know please.

11. School Board Reports

11.A. TLN Report - Mr. Robert Safdie - Inman advised, next item is School Board Reports. Mr. Safdie the TLN Report. Safdie advised, I have several issues, but I think the most important one is a Special Session of the State Legislature. They passed a piece of legislation allowing Santa Claus to come down our chimneys without wearing a mask and permitting them to place presents under trees. So I think that is an important innovation that is happening now and I think we should all be grateful for it. It is a very exciting time. Inman advised, that will definitely make the kids happy.

12. Board Member(s) Report from Training(s) - Inman advised, next item is the Board Members Report from Training. I know several of us went to the TSBA Annual Convention. Does anybody; Mrs. Hamby. Hamby advised, I would just like to say the speakers this year at the conference were outstanding. It was very moving and touching. I feel like we have learned a lot. It was a great conference this year. Karge advised, legal jeopardy was a lot of fun. Safdie advised, it was fun. We had a good time. Inman advised, I missed out on that one. I went to another one, but ya there were several sessions we went to and learned a lot of good information. Learned some information that we didn't like, but all in all it was a really good convention. Safdie advised, Mr. Chairman, the one thing that, there are two things that I picked up. One was the issue related to my comments about free speech in the classroom and the legislation that the legislature passed and the Governor signed. Making it illegal for 14 items to be discussed in the classroom. Primarily my concern was free speech. I was told by the lawyers there in a question that I asked that teachers in the elementary school and high school are under contract and this contract specifies that they follow the state guidelines. The state guidelines for their curriculum. The curriculum can be taught in a lot of different ways just as long as the criteria is met through the state. So my comment three months ago was that there was an issue with free speech involved in it and I was told no. There is not an issue of free speech, because our teachers; there might be free speech in the college system, which I have a background in. But teachers in the elementary and high school do not have free speech and must stick with the criteria of the state. So that is one thing I would like to apologize, because of my personal bias related to teaching. I didn't realize; I was set straight by the lawyers there, okay. So the next issue was the mask issue; the mask mandate and I felt like when I read the legislation that it was, that the board did not have a say so in if a school had to be closed or if a school had to, if the COVID cases increased to a certain point that the board really had no jurisdiction in that. Because the legislation is written kind of ambiguous. At least I thought it was ambiguous, but again I was straightened out by the lawyers at the meeting and they said no, the principal has a primary responsibility when a certain level is reached with COVID cases or any illnesses from my interpretation now that then they must make the request to either quarantine, not quarantine. Either close the school or

have their students wear masks and Mrs. Ina you know more about that. I am sure you have discussed it with your principals. Maxwell replied, we are still learning about that. Safdie continued, so again I would like to apologize, because I thought that the board did not have any final discretionary powers, but it has to go through the system and finally to the board, but it has to begin with the principals. I could have included that in the TLN Report, but I thought Santa Claus was more appropriate. Inman replied, thank you Mr. Safdie. Inman then replied, Mrs. Boston. Boston advised, I just wanted to check with Dr. Maxwell. Did you happen to, were you able to go down to the BEP meeting? Maxwell replied, yes. Boston asked, did you learn anything? Maxwell replied, we don't have any example of what Students Center Funding looks like at this time. So, they told us that they would also be setting up meetings with Boards of Education, County Commissioners, County Mayors, Director of Schools. So I am looking towards an invite to come to all of us. It hasn't come yet in my email and later in Mrs. Harris's report tonight she is going to share a little bit more information about the Tuesday night meeting. Boston replied, I will just hold off.

13. Legal Report - Mr. Earl Patton - Inman advised, next item on the agenda is the Legal Report, Mr. Patton. Patton advised, nothing new to report. The only pending litigation is the JUUL litigation and I have no updates for you there. Inman replied, thank you Mr. Patton. I like those kinds of reports. Patton replied, those are the best kind.

14. Board Retreat - Inman advised, the next item on the agenda is the Board Retreat. We need to try and look at our calendars and try to see about when we want to do the retreat. I'm assuming we will do it here, unless somebody has any other ideas. Karge asked, I am assuming the Bahamas is out of the question? Inman replied, yes. The Bahamas is out of the question. Hamby advised, January 15th. Safdie advised, January 5th. Hamby replied, 15th. Safdie replied, 5th. The first weekend in January. Hamby advised, that's a Wednesday. The 5th is a Wednesday. Safdie replied, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday. How about that? I am going to be gone. Boston replied, I don't want it here. Safdie continued, I am going to be gone January 9th until February 20th. So if we could have, if I miss it, I miss it. Inman advised, I would hate for you to miss it Mr. Safdie. Karge advised, I will be out four days. Hamby asked, we are doing it all in one day, right? Inman replied, yes we can do it all in one day. Last year we did it in two days, because we were on zoom and we just didn't feel like that we could do a full 7 hours. Inman asked, when are you coming back in February? Safdie replied, February 20th. Inman replied, February 20th; wow. You are going to take a long trip. Safdie advised, it has been coming for three years. I haven't been any place. Inman advised, our regular board meeting is the 24th of February. What about February 26th? No one objected. Inman replied, I don't think there is anything pressing that we have to do right now. Patton asked, what would the times be? Karge replied, like 8am to 3pm. Inman replied, it seems like we have done it in the past. It has to be 7 hours. Like 8am to 3pm, something like that. Does that sound right? It gives us time for lunch or we could work through lunch. Okay, so we are going to say February 26th. Safdie asked, what time? Inman replied, we will say 8am to 3pm. Any other discussion on the Board Retreat? No one responded.

Mr. King left the boardroom @ 6:35pm.

15. Director's Report - Dr. Ina Maxwell - Inman advised, the next item on the agenda is the Director's Report. So I will turn it over to Dr. Maxwell.

15.A. *CCSNP National School Lunch Program Equipment Assistance Grant (See Exhibit #3) Maxwell advised, thank you Mr. Inman. The first item 15.A. we have the Cumberland County School Nutrition Program is applying for a National School Lunch Program Equipment Assistance Grant and this is hopefully for a new walk-in cooler and freezer at South Cumberland. The rough guesstimate is that it would cost approximately \$75,000, but this grant is not one that we know how much we would be getting and Mrs. Hamby is here if you have any questions. It does require board approval. Karge moved and Hamby seconded the motion. Inman advised, Mrs. Karge with a first and Mrs. Hamby with a second. Any discussion? No one responded. A Voice Vote was taken.

15.B. CCSNP 2021-2022 Annual Report/Program Overview (See Exhibit #4) Maxwell advised, the next item is the Cumberland County School Nutrition Programs Annual Report and Program Overview. Mrs. Hamby provided lots of great information for us regarding her program that she oversees and I would just like to say she does a tremendous job ensuring that our needs, our student needs are met and we do appreciate all that she does. She is here if you have any questions that you would like to ask or comments. She would be glad to answer. Inman asked, does anybody have any questions? No one responded. Maxwell and Inman replied, thank you Mrs. Hamby.

15.C. *State CTE Grants (See Exhibit #5) Maxwell advised, the next item 15.C. These are State CTE Grants for our middle schools for Pine View, South and Brown Elementary and this is exciting what our middle schools are venturing into with the College Career and Technical Education Programming. I mean how are we doing this? Bernabei replied, no. 6 schools have decided to join this and so based on their numbers. We are going to serve about 429 children. Boston asked, is that what the principals turned in? This is what we need. Bernabei replied, the principals were given their students that were approaching based on TCAP scores and this grant is targeting those students. Boston asked, so these are referred to as tutors? The other one are interventionist. Bernabei replied, yes. They are certified teachers. My tutors are going to be assistants. Boston asked, okay so these do not have to be certified? Bernabei replied, no. Boston replied, the interventions are certified. Bernabei replied, correct. Boston replied, okay, gotch you. That is all I have. Inman asked, any further questions? 15.F. November/December 2021 ESSER Report (See Exhibit #8) Maxwell advised, the next item I just have a brief ESSER monthly report. The first bullet Mrs. Darci covered with the high dosage tutoring. The state is sending us reports monthly to tell us how much funding has been spent down from each ESSER. 98% of ESSER 1 funds have been spent. It would have been at 100%, but a vendor gave a discount, which you know in hard times you want those discounts. You want a discount anytime. So there will be some adjustment there. 16% of ESSER 2.0 funds have been spent down and implementation continues. The request for qualifications for Project Engineering for ESSER are in the process. We have proofread some drafts and we are hopeful that proposals will be out soon. ESSER 3 is still in the review process at the state level. We did receive some feedback on the Community Engagement Plan of ESSER 3 and it was stated that our student feedback was low in comparison with our student enrollment. So our Federal Programs Department has been in the process of gathering additional student feedback. Two grade levels from each school have been chosen randomly to participate in the focus group and they receive the same feedback sheet that was used in August. Initial analysis of the data shows consistency with the original data collection in August. As soon as we receive approval for ESSER 3 I will send you all an email with stars all around it. Karge advised, I have two questions. So the 98%, the other 2% do we have to send back to the Federal Government? Maxwell replied, we will work diligently with our Regional Consultant too. Karge replied, to see if we could reallocate. Maxwell continued, yes. Karge asked, then the feedback was received from our? Maxwell replied, this is from the consultant assigned to our region. Karge replied, thank you.

Inman advised, I noticed you took a deep breath there for a second. Patton replied, well you know the Azure Contract I mean in all honesty you know there are some issues there. You know that the board needs to consider thoroughly, but we have done the best that we

can in assuring that we are covered and you know the board is identified from incidents that can happen in flight. Inman replied, okay. Boston advised, and we discussed this during the committee meeting and we went over all of the possibilities and felt in the best interest of the students this contract was as sound as we were going to get. 16.F. Safety Committee-Mrs. Rebecca Hamby - Inman advised, next is the Safety Committee. Mrs. Hamby, do you have anything? Hamby replied, I didn't have a meeting, but I was tasked last month, the last board meeting that we had to look into trying to find out what we could do about the triangle at Homestead. I have not received any information back from the state or the county as far as what could possibly be done, but I do know according to what I read in the paper TDOT is working on the triangle and I am not sure what all their plans are. Now they have got a huge plan and also I believe that the principal at Homestead is also working on this and looking into it. Maxwell asked, if I may? Hamby replied, yes. Maxwell continued, Mr. Magnusson and Mrs. Edmonds have been working for the past several weeks to evaluate the situation and for the past three weeks they have maintained data. The administration has indicated there has not been a time that traffic has been backed up on the school property within the last three weeks when the bell rang. So there was like no traffic backed up in the Homestead parking area drive through. Two of the fourteen days that they evaluated traffic had been backed up on the main highway, but there was no backup within the school parking drive itself. We will continue to monitor this and hopefully we will have more information forthcoming about what the state plans to do, because it would be a huge benefit. Boston asked, did they have any suggestions, because I think the two individuals that spoke was more concerned about backed up on 127 and 68? Hamby advised, then what was in. Boston continued, then on the school property. Maxwell replied. That traffic at this moment, I mean, because those are folks going to work. Boston asked, so it's not ours? Maxwell replied, it's not. Inman replied, it's a mixture. Maxwell replied, right. It's a mixture. It could be someone trying to get into the school, but as far as when they entered that long drive, when the bell rang it was clear. Inman replied, I went out there. We had our meeting on Thursday, so it would have been on then next Tuesday before I could get there and I went out there. I was there about 6:30am and I watched and I will be honest with you, I was amazed at how well the

traffic flows and how courteous all the different drivers were allowing people in and out of different areas. It backed up on 127. That was the side that I concentrated on and it backed up, probably started around 7:30am-7:40am it started backing up. It didn't get all of the way to the Homestead church on that day. Now it doesn't mean that it doesn't do it other times, but it did not on the day I was there. They talked about people getting on the shoulder to drive to get in and I only saw three, I saw three vehicles do that, but that was at 7:45am whenever they did that. Boston advised, I don't think we can control people going to work. Inman replied, no. There is nothing that I saw that we could do to help anything on 127. There is nothing, because it's just people going to work and like I said I was absolutely amazed how polite everybody was at allowing people in and out of different areas. Boston asked, would a second entrance help at all? Boston advised, they've got two. One around the back and one in the front. Inman replied, that I don't know. That is something Bo and Mrs. Edmonds will have to work out and try to figure out. But I saw people using that back entrance. I don't know who all. Magnusson replied, the little ones are dropped off. Inman advised, Pre-K. I saw people using that back entrance back there, but me personally I don't see anything we can do any differently than what we are doing to make it any better on 127. Have you seen anything Bo? Magnusson replied, no sir. I think it is like you said the flow on the school property itself is flowing fine. At the bell time reported to us, is every line is backed up along school property at bell time. So if you get there right at 7:45 you might get trapped in that 127 traffic, but there is not a line on the school property. If you get there 5-10 minutes earlier and you are probably not going to have any problems. Boston replied, there again we can not prohibit or control people trying to get to work. Safdie advised, the only coming south on 127 moving north. You know the only way to relieve any sort of congestion for parents who are coming north from the state park would be to make another access point, but the only way you can make another access point would be to tear down that brick house, which has historic value and fill in and create a you know a pathway. I don't see it possible. Boston replied, and it may not be. I mean I was just, but if at 7:45 if they're getting caught in traffic, because you have to stop at the triangle wait until 68 passes or somebody gives you an okay to go. Safdie asked, you're talking about southbound traffic? Boston replied, right. Then that's where you are going to get caught up. If you are bringing a child to school and you get caught into the workforce traffic you know we can't resolve that. Inman advised, and I saw and I don't know if it was the same police officer or if there were two. There was one at the exit of where they came out from the Homestead School. The driveway, there was a police officer there directing traffic and I saw a police officer come down further at the triangle and try to get traffic flowing coming from the state park. That direction and he helped quite a bit. He stopped this traffic on 68 and let those get out and I don't know like I said I couldn't tell if it was the same police officer or if it was two different ones. Magnusson advised, sometimes they will have somebody come and help. Hamby advised, that is what I was going to say. If they have an extra they will have someone come. Inman continued, like I said they did an awesome job. Boston asked, I wonder if we could, Bo help me out here. Just make a note to the parents and say this is what we've observed. If you don't want to get caught in the workforce traffic, possibly leave your house 5 or 10 minutes earlier. That might resolve some of the tardies. Safdie advised, an effort on our part. Magnusson advised, I did actually, when I first approached the administrator she was like, "what". She was very surprised. She was like I've never seen any traffic when the bell rings on our property. She thought that was being said, it was backed all the way out still trying to get in the school and then she did the survey and watched it for three weeks. She saw the same thing, never was there anybody there when

the bell rings on property. Inman advised, it was all out on 127. Magnusson advised, there's pictures from what I have seen out there they are talking about putting a light where the state is. I don't know if you have seen that out there, but a light and controlling it that way. Hamby advised, which might help a little. Magnusson replied, maybe. Safdie advised, there is, you know, on the intersection of 127 and 68 there, you know if you are looking towards Dayton or the valley to your right there is a blind curve there. I mean it is horrible. Even when there is not a lot of traffic it is hard to see, because people come around that at 45 and 55 mph. Boston asked, does our SRO; he stands at 68, right? Hamby and Inman replied, yes. Boston continued, and we don't have anyone on 127 directing? Magnusson advised, sometimes. Boston advised, just whenever they have extra. Magnusson continued, the thing is if he is over there on 68 he is getting the school property cleared. He can stop traffic and that is why it is working well. He is keeping that flow going over there. Safdie asked, where on 68 is he? At the entrance? Magnusson replied, at the exit. Boston and Inman replied, at the exit. Safdie asked, but not at the intersection? Magnusson replied, right. Inman advised, like I said I saw somebody, there was a police officer who showed up at least two different times that came down to the intersection down there at 127 and 68. He stopped traffic from 68 and got 127 going. Like I said, it worked and like I said there were three vehicles that I saw that got on the shoulder and they were on the shoulder at 7:45am. Hamby advised, so they were running behind. Inman replied, yes. Safdie advised, well there are lots of reasons parents can run behind. Hamby replied, yes there is. Boston advised multiple children.

17. Chief Financial Officer's Report-Mrs. Kacee Harris - Inman replied, the next item on the agenda is the Chief Financial Officer's Report. Kacee, we will hand it over to you. Harris advised, alright so I thought I would start with a couple of updates. We have completed our Internal School Funds Audit from last year. We did have one finding this year and that was monthly financial reports were not adequately reviewed and corrected. We have corrected this issue since. We had a new bookkeeper and a new principal and there was no question of any wrongdoing. It was just know better do better and they really know what they were looking for. So we have done some training there. We had a bookkeeper training and we are planning a principal training to just get the basics of those financials that they look at, at the school level. So that was the only finding and I do have the result and all of the financial statements in my office if anyone would like to review those. The next update I wanted to talk about was the State Funding Formula. Dr. Maxwell and I attended the Upper Cumberland Region Town Hall on Tuesday down in Jackson County. It was the last one of eight that the state was hosting. As they are changing the formula for funding public education, which at first is very exciting and then a little scary on the end. So our BEP Formula that has been in place every budget season we talk about how it's not quite enough. I think the basic that we need to remember when we talk about funds is it needs to more and it needs to stay with public schools. We didn't learn a lot at the meeting. It was really more of a they wanted to hear what people wanted in the new formula. The basics of it, it will be changing from a resource based formula to a student based. So they are encouraging and still accepting public comments. We supplied some at the meeting, but the 18 subcommittees are still meeting. They will meet twice a month for the next three months and they promised at this meeting that every email, every twitter, every Facebook comment would be passed along to the proper subcommittee for consideration. I do have an email to share with you. If you would like to share. They are really looking for, forward facing, in the future, what does every student need every day to

be successful at school. So if you would like to email them, that email is tnedu.funding@tn.gov. So again that is tnedu.funding@tn.gov. So they didn't have a model for us to see yet. After some questioning they did share with us that some states models that they have shared with their subcommittees are the Maryland Model, the Texas Model, Massachusetts, and Ohio. I think they shared that one of those was over 2,000 pages. I am sure there will be more information to come, but I think the most important thing right now that we can do is for you all to give your personal input. You know I shared my input as a mom with three kids, the wife of a teacher, a former teacher and as the CFO. So it's some different perspectives there. I encourage everybody to share your perspective. You know I thought about what I wanted for my kids and everybody else's kids everyday at school and I also thought about district wide what I know in my position we have to have to be able to function. So again obviously all of us wouldn't be here if we weren't stout supporters of public education and we want more money. You know one of the things that we have shared is that our teachers, our schools do wonderful things. Our district does wonderful things on a shoestring budget and imagine what we could do if given the funding and the chance to really make our public schools right for every kid and to help every kid get what they need. A little about that. If you google Tennessee Education Funding there is a wealth of information. They have a really strong PR campaign, but I do encourage you to get your voice out there. We will be sharing information with you all and as Dr. Maxwell said they do plan on having some specific informational sessions for boards and commissions. One thing I did learn at the meeting was they did say that it would have a 14-16 month runway. I interpret that, that even if they decide on a formula when they go back into session in January that it would be another year before they implement it. That gives me a little bit of peace in that it's a big decision to rewrite and go to a totally new model and we don't want anything to be rushed. Boston advised, Lipinski said, 2023. Harris replied, ok. Boston continued, now when we were in the Legislative Session he indicated to us that the bill was not even written yet and that the subcommittees would come to them, but they were looking at 2023 for this BEP formula. Now we always start like July 1st with our money and they start giving us the numbers, what April, May. End of May, something like that. Harris replied, April. Boston continued, he indicated 2023 is what they were looking at. My next question is what suggestions did you have as a CFO for the BEP formula? Harris replied, so I actually, I took a book and ran out of time and they had to pull me off of the mic with the crock, but some of the things, you know I started and I really just sat down okay what does everyone kid need everyday and what does the district need. I started with the people and that we have to have enough people to not only show up to fill our teaching jobs, our custodian jobs, our bus drivers, our subs, but we also need higher salaries for our certified staff and our non-certified staff and that needs to be funded by the state at a higher level. That was at the very top of my list. Mental Health professionals and nurses should be funded at a minimum at the national standard, but I think if we are rewriting a formula that we need to use that as our minimum and we need to do better and go better and build a formula that would hold on a while. But I definitely think we are very lucky our schools each have a school nurse, but the state doesn't fund that. The state funds us a little over three nurses; partial funds over three nurses. Boston advised, well they also only fund so many certified and then we have over and above that, which we fund. Harris replied, exactly and every single district is in that same boat. So there is a fundamental flaw with how they are figuring that. Boston asked, is there going to be a push to fund all certified? Harris replied, I certainly hope so. I think that was echoed from some other voices in the meeting as well that we need more funding, more positions and to really raise the bar to where we are

not in that bottom quadrant. Inman advised, well that would be one of my mine concerns as a board member is that if the state gives us a mandate then they need to fund it. Harris replied, exactly. Inman continued, if they tell us we need to have x number of teachers then they need to fund it and that is not what they are doing right now. Just like you said, we have teachers above and beyond the BEP, but we have them because the state requires us to have them. That is where I would be coming from is, I think that they need to if they're going to require a teacher then they need to fund it. Boston advised, well and Lipinski, I think I am saying that correctly. I think he is actually a state representative. Fairly new, but he is the instigator of all of this. He said his biggest complaint from teachers was that when the state sent to the county a 4½% raise that was not passed on to the teachers, because the local boards then have the authority to spread the wealth and to pay some of those certified teachers we pay with those fundings. Inman advised, that is where it comes in and gets tricky, because they say it is a 4%, but it is a 4% on just what they fund. Anybody that we fund above that, I mean we could give a 4% to just the ones that they fund, but then you are going to leave out about 100 teachers that doesn't get a pay raise. Boston advised, that was his big push, I think. So if they fund the teachers and they send us a 4% raise we can smile and pass that along without any problems. So if they will fund the educators that it takes to teach our children we can do better. I mean, I think we can. But just for information purposes when you all are considering this and sending your comments into the state. Lipinski's push was the teachers get the funding and their raises and it wasn't going in their pockets. Well I don't want the responsibility or the push back from that. That it is your local board that does it and right now that is what we are getting. So if we could, you know, fund our teachers. Harris replied, and that was another point that was echoed, the unfunded mandates. For example, the Tom Crone Enact deals with PE teachers and the number of minutes that kids have to have PE, but they didn't necessarily come with that extra funding. So that is challenging. Some of the other things were funding full time RTI teachers and paraprofessionals. Hiring, funding those additional teachers to help reduce class size and meet those mandates that we have. Additional funding for teacher selected materials and then also to include those things that are district level expenses. That are really if they are even mentioned in the BEP funding formula it is very small. So, the things like we couldn't survive without HR and that is not funded at all in the BEP formula as it is now. Inventory management, you know to protect our assets and to help us keep up with that. That is not funded. We suggested a computer technician at every school. Continuing support and expansion of CTE classes and a couple of other people spoke to this point too. While we feel like we've got a lot of money right now that we can use on our maintenance for our buildings and infrastructure. That's a one time, feeling the needs are greater than that and the new funding formula should really support something continually to help us up keep of that. Because as we know that is a huge chunk of our budget. So as I mentioned I'm married to a PE teacher and a Coach, so some funding for those people who are willing to give up their time as far as extra curricular equipment and supplements. I think that should be part of that whole child experience. So, please do, speak out. I encourage you to be thoughtful about it and sit down and think as a board member, as a parent, as a community member, and really give them your input. I am sure there is already a lot of ideas and things that have already been decided, but I am an optimist that every voice counts and everybody's opinion is important. If we raise them we will see improvements. Boston asked, Kacee could I and I don't know how easily accessible this information is, but at our board retreat if we could get the information of BEP covers this many teachers. We cover this many teachers. Harris replied, sure. Boston continued, how many do we have outside of the BEP

funding? Then that will help us; sending our voice and our opinions in, because we can be specific to our county. How much instructional material funding do they send? Harris replied, sure. Boston continued, and things of that nature. If you can kind of work up a little presentation I think the knowledge would help us; sending in our personal opinions. Because they're going to discuss it, but I don't think any decisions are going to be made until much later. Because they're getting; the BEP is so complicated. They just want to make sure they get it right. Inman advised, I heard; I'm sorry I heard one gentleman make the comment while we were down there that he was involved in the development of the BEP and he said it took them 3 years to develop the BEP formula and he does not see them being able to come up with a new formula in the next 6 weeks. Boston replied, oh no, no, no. Lipinski pretty well said and the four legislators that were there, we will be lucky to get it in 2023 and that was kind of their date goal. Don't know if it will happen. Safdie advised, and don't forget the under current. During the Leadership Conference a question was asked. Is there any reasonable thinking that would, that the legislature would choose to fund more private schools and the lawyers there, Chuck and Scott and Lee said, that is a very real consideration given the temperament of the legislature now. There could be a movement to stick in a follow the money, follow the students. Wherever the student goes, the money follows, kind of formula. So we have to keep that in consideration when we discuss or talk to our legislature. I know it is public funds, but public funds supporting private schools that don't have the same criteria. That don't have the same salary scales. That don't have the same requirements for students is just totally unfair. Inman advised, okay. I think we have discussed that pretty well. Let's go ahead and let Mrs. Harris do her statement.

Harris advised, the next update is I have met with the state contracted appraisers for our Rini Property up on 127 North and it will be a bit of a wait, but the state will be taking that entire lot. I think it is just shy of ½ acre for phase 2 of the 127 project. So we expect that the state will bring to the board a formal offer at the earliest February, maybe March. So just FYI we did meet with them. They've got a timeline and the state has another timeline, but they did say it would be a formal offer and it would be made to the full board. Karge replied, but they are going to anax it either way? Harris replied, right. The whole lot will be taken. Boston asked, all the way back? Harris replied, the whole thing; yep all the way back. Safdie asked, how many acres is that, 2? Harris replied, it is just shy of half.

17.A. Monthly Financial Report (See Exhibit #13) - Harris continued, alright so then to the regular stuff. The October financial statements. We are in good shape here. In October we receipted \$5.7 million in revenues. For a year to date total of \$15.7 million against our budget of \$56.4 million. That is right around where we need to be. Then for our expenditures we spent in October about \$4.1 million for a year to date total of \$15.9 against our budget of \$59.8 million. Are there any questions there? No one responded.

17.B. Monthly Sales Tax Report (See Exhibit #14) Harris advised, this month I did get the Sales Tax Report for us. It continues to show good things. So Merry Christmas. You can see there that the November number was \$1.1 million and the budget was just about a million. So a little bit of a surplus there, which brings the annual surplus at this point to \$451,000. So some very positive numbers especially if you listen to the news. We are still spending some money in Cumberland County. Inman advised, everybody shop local. It helps.

17.C. *Foxfire/Oakley Dr. Property Advertise to Sale (See Exhibit #15 & #16) Harris advised, the next item on the agenda we had some discussion last time about the Foxfire/Oakley Dr. Property. We did some research on that. We think the quickest and cheapest way if the board so wishes would be to just advertise that for sale without going through a realtor. It would save the realtor fees and that is what we decided to do with the Bakers Crossroads Property. So we could advertise those together. Save a little bit of money and the process would be the same. They would turn in sealed bids for you all to entertain. Safdie asked, is Mr. Brock agreeable to that method? Not Tony, but Nathan Brock. Harris replied, yes, yes. We consulted with him. Tony Brock replied, I am in agreement as well. Let's sell that. Harris continued, I did think that was something we would need a vote on just to make it official. Boston asked, have we already done the Bakers Crossroad Property? Harris replied, when this discussion came up we put that on hold, because we thought we might be able to save some money and advertisement is about \$500.00. So if we could combine the two it would save us a little bit of money. Boston replied, I make a motion to advertise. Inman advised, I already got Mrs. Karge with a motion. Boston advised, I will second. Inman continued, Mrs. Boston with a second. Boston asked, now that is including the Bakers Crossroads right? Harris replied, yes. So that one has already been approved for us to advertise. This would be to approve the Fox Fire/ Oakley Drive Property to be advertised as well. Inman asked, is there any discussion? No one responded. A Voice Vote was taken.

17.D. *Sheriff's Portable Resolution (See Exhibit #17) - Harris advised, the next resolution is a little bit different. We've been approached by some folks from the County Sheriff's Department that heard we were getting rid of some portables and they are probably interested in taking one of those. They would pay to have it moved. There are a lot of pieces that have to fall into place, but with this resolution if the board so chooses it would go ahead and make it to when and if those pieces do fall into place on their end for approval that they wouldn't be waiting on us to meet again. So it would just be that we would convey a retired portable classroom to the Sheriff's Department for training and other official business. The Sheriff's Department would take the full legal and financial responsibility for moving it with a licensed company. Hamby replied, I make a motion that we approve. Safdie replied, second. Inman advised, Mrs. Hamby with a motion. We will get to the questions in just a second. Mr. Safdie with a second. Now discussion. Hale asked, don't we use those portables still or are we entertaining trying to get rid of them? Inman replied, the plan many years ago was to get rid of all portables if at all possible and we have been doing it a little at a time, but I will let Dr. Maxwell take that question about what's going on right now. Maxwell replied, these are portables that are not being used for students. It is my understanding, correct Mrs. Kacee? Harris replied, right. They are in rough shape. Maxwell continued, yes. Hale replied, okay. Harris advised, we wouldn't want students in them. Inman advised a lot of the portables that the students are not being used for; they're used for storage. Karge asked, this won't have any problem as far as it would have to go on a surplus list and then blah blah, blah? We would just convey it over and no harm no foul? Harris replied, right. We

would retire them and they are going to come and tour them. There are four that are up for retirement this cycle. Two at South and two at Homestead. So they are going to come and tour them and see if there is one that they like better than the other or if they are even interested once they see the whole package. Karge asked, we wouldn't normally sale these on the surplus or would we normally? Harris replied, we do. When we get rid of them we usually try to advertise them for sale and then when now one buys them as in the last three years then if you will pay. We have to go through a process, but then at that point if you will pay, if you want one, anyone in the public can pay. I think the last one we had to do a dollar for that legal purpose and then they paid to have it moved. Karge replied, great. Safdie advised, moving it is a bit expensive. It could cost anywhere from \$3,000 to \$5,000. Inman advised, or more. We have a motion and a second. Is there any other discussion? No one responded. A Voice Vote was taken.

I respectfully request permission to accept funding for and to participate in the FY22 Pre-Monitoring Fiscal Supports Grant. Below is information from the Tennessee Department of Education detailing the grant and its purpose:

The FY22 Pre-Monitoring Fiscal Supports Grant is intended to provide funding to LEAs to contract with an individual or company with experience managing federal education grant funds for the purpose of providing grant administrative services such as program allowability review, document review, and document preparation in compliance with the federal ESSER guidelines. Support may include but is not limited to:

- financial planning, programming, and expenditure of funds in alignment with ESSER 1.0, ESSER 2.0, and ESSER 3.0 funds,
- testing internal controls in accordance with 2 CFR § 200.303,
- testing development and retention of documents that align with reimbursement methods outlined in 2 CFR § 200.305(b)(3),
- reviewing equipment management requirements in alignment with 2 CFR § 200.313,
- testing for material weaknesses in general procurement standards in accordance with 2 CFR § 200.318,

- ensuring LEAs are following competition requirements outlined in 2 CFR § 200.319 and local procurement method policies and procedures support the requirements of 2 CFR § 200.320,
- testing for material weakness in record retention processes aligning with 2 CFR § 200.334,
- testing prior written approval methods described in 2 CFR § 200.407,
- ensuring alignment with the expectations of ESSER funds and construction as related to the Davis-Bacon Act concerning labor costs related to capital project expenses, and
- providing other fiscal/cross-cutting support and capacity deemed necessary by the contracted individual or company.

The funding is **not** provided to contract for external audit services. The Comptroller of the Treasury is statutorily required to perform or contract for the financial, compliance, and federal Single Audit of these funds.

Local Education Agencies (LEAs) that are eligible for federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund Act (ESSER 1.0), Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (ESSER 2.0), and/or the American Rescue Plan Act (ARP ESSER/ESSER 3.0) funds are encouraged to apply for a Pre-Monitoring Fiscal Supports Grant to increase LEA-level capacity and strengthen policies and practices in fiscal or cross-cutting policies, procedures, and/or practices to prepare LEAs to meet all monitoring and oversight obligations associated with these funds.

LEAs that complete the Intent to Apply with interest in receiving funds for these purposes will receive access to a funding application in ePlan and be notified via email of the application details once all LEAs respond to this Intent to Apply. A minimum of \$34,246.57 will be granted to all LEAs completing the Intent to Apply.

Tennessee's Funding for Student Success: Student-Based Formula *Draft Framework for Public Review and Comment*

Tennessee's Funding Formula Engagement Process

In October 2021, Governor Bill Lee committed to a robust public engagement process to explore a potential student-based funding formula for Tennessee. The Tennessee Department of Education created 18 subcommittees to focus on this work, with Tennesseans from across the state providing public comment on what they would like to see funding in a student-based funding formula, and at what levels.

Why Now?

- Tennessee has a long history of implementing bold initiatives to support student achievement.
- After decades of discussion, there is long-standing desire for a formula rewrite in Tennessee and significant recent momentum from a robust public engagement process that has produced consistent recommendations as previous reviews. The current budget landscape creates a unique opportunity to do that work now.
- The federal COVID-19 relief funding to districts provides an opportunity to supplement any local needs, bring in additional expertise, and capitalize on the current openness and need for change.

The Goal of a New Formula

Aligned with best practice, Tennessee's new funding formula for K-12 public school students would incentivize strategic and efficient spending to accelerate student achievement and support a more thoughtful allocation at the local level.

What Must Be Different in a New Formula for Tennessee

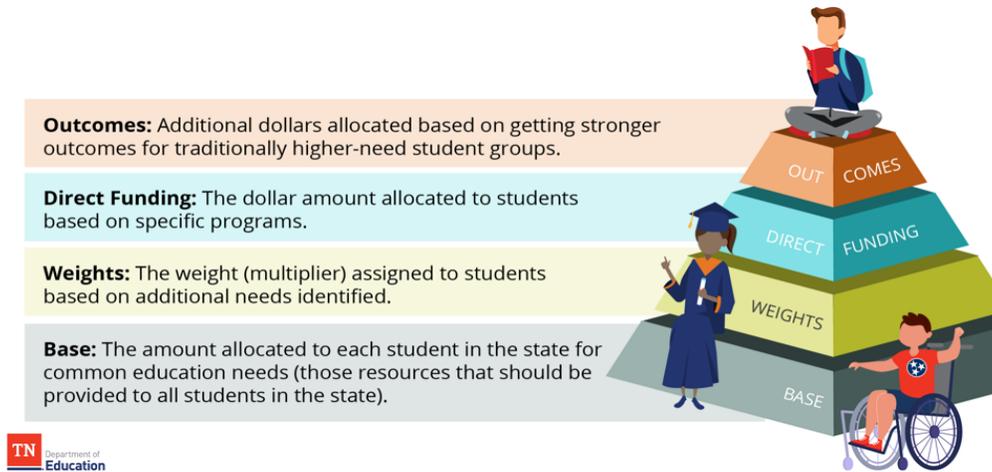
- Strategic for all students (student-based; funding students not systems)
- Easy to understand
- Sustainable
- Outcomes-driven
- Flexible

To date, subcommittees have met four times and have provided a series of draft recommendations based on public comment. All public comment has been routed to tnedu.funding@tn.gov for the record. Subcommittee members, materials, resources, and recordings of the subcommittee meetings are posted on the department's [website](#). Please note that there have been additional town hall meetings, engagements, etc. that have generated public comments on this topic.

Tennessee's Funding for Student Success would provide a student-based funding strategy that empowers parents and the public to understand how K-12 public education funding from the state is being spent at the district- and school-levels to ensure the success of their students.

The Draft Proposed Funding Framework

Leveraging the robust work and input from the subcommittees, the department's formulations for a potential new student-based funding framework began with considerations of funding that exists within the current funding formula, the Basic Education Program (BEP). All items funded in the current formula and some additional funding for K-12 supports that currently exist outside of the BEP are accounted for in the proposed formula framework below, either in the funding base or weights.



Base

The proposed Funding for Student Success formula will fund the following items as part of the base:

- Educator salaries
- Nurses
- Counselors and school-based supports
- RTI² support
- District-specific needs (vary by district, so base may consider locally driven additions)
- Technology
- Coordinated School Health in every district

Weights

The proposed funding framework includes weights for 1) Poverty and Concentrated Poverty, 2) Rural, 3) Unique Learning Needs, and 4) Charter Schools.

Poverty and Concentrated Poverty

- This funding weight would ensure students who are living in poverty get additional weight of funding to accommodate the needed services to prepare them for academic success, addresses the multiplier effect of having large proportions of students with greater needs, and equally benefits rural and urban districts.
- *Data:* Direct Certification (student) and Title I Status (concentration)
- *Impact:* Economically disadvantaged students (321,602 students) and concentrated poverty (569,108 students)
- *Weight Comparability: Heavy*

Rural

- This funding weight would ensure students can receive excellent in-classroom supports, even when they attend a rural district that may see higher costs for services like transportation or local services that do not receive the same benefits from economies of scale.
- *Data:* NCES Code (federal school designations for Rural: Fringe, Distant, Remote and Town: Remote)
- *Impact:* 315,384 students in rural schools, plus additional weight for small/sparse LEAs under 3,000 students
- *Weight Comparability: Moderate*

Unique Learning Needs

- This funding weight would ensure districts can make strong spending decisions to meet the student-specific contexts within their local community, which can vary dramatically across districts. It would provide a tiered approach to ensure appropriate funding for Students with Disabilities, Gifted, English learners, and students with qualified Section 504 Dyslexia plans.
- *Data:* Must have federal/state plan and be verified through existing state test/assessment.
- *Impact:* Varies based on student services received. Students would be eligible for funding for each of the service(s) received and are not limited to one category.
- *Weight Comparability:* **Varies** based on specific student needs (heavy, moderate, light).

Charter Schools

- This funding weight would ensure that when a charter school utilizes a school facility owned by the local school district and incurs all rent plus maintenance and improvement costs to provide school facilities for their students, additional funding will be available to support in-classroom services and resources for students.
- *Data:* Statewide charter school enrollment
- *Impact:* 42,186 students
- *Weight Comparability:* **Light**

Direct Funding

The proposed funding framework would include direct funding, or additional dollars to districts, for 1) Fast Growing, 2) Tutoring, and 3) Career and Technical Education (CTE).

Fast Growing: Significant enrollment growth within a school community warrants same-year support for the services provided as a result.

Tutoring: Funding to provide high-dosage, low-ratio tutoring via TN ALL Corps for rising 4th grade students who scored at “Below” on the 3rd grade TCAP (as outlined in the *Learning Loss and Student Acceleration* statute). Students would have individualized learning plan and data submissions, as required.

CTE (College, Career and Technical Education): All CTE funding would be provided in one area as direct funding for participating students. This would include funding for staffing, materials, and emphasize those courses and pathways that are high-demand and high-value. This currently impacts 141,843 students.

Outcomes

The outcomes section would provide a per-student bonus for performance. The current recommendations for consideration would apply to all students but include additional weight for economically disadvantaged students. All data listed below is data that is already collected by the department. Additional public feedback is requested on which of these areas should ultimately be included in the proposal.

- Literacy
 - Data Source: Continuing to request feedback from public comment
- ReadyGrad Indicators¹ with Outcomes
 - Data Source: existing data
 - ACT: 21 or higher
 - SAT: 1060 or higher
 - Advanced Placement (AP): pass the AP exam with a qualifying score (earns college credit)
 - Cambridge International Examinations (CIE): pass the exam with a qualifying score (earns college credit)
 - College Level Examination (CLEP): pass the exam with a qualifying score (earns college credit)
 - Industry Certification: passes the exam

¹ ACT and SAT; Complete four early postsecondary opportunities (EPSOs); Complete two EPSOs + industry certification; Complete two EPSOs + a score of 31 on the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) Armed Forces Qualifying Test (AFQT); Complete two EPSOs + WorkKeys National Career Readiness Certificate

- International Baccalaureate (IB): pass the exam with a qualifying score (earns college credit)
- Dual Enrollment: passes the course
- Local Dual Credit: pass the course
- Statewide Dual Credit: pass the course
- CTE Completers
- WBL and Apprenticeships
- FAFSA Completion

Additional Considerations Supported by Subcommittees

- **PK – 3rd Grade Band:** There is a strong push to lower class sizes in the youngest grades to achieve stronger outcomes. Research demonstrates the value of class sizes under 15 students, as well as high dosage tutoring. This could be most efficiently achieved by funding a paraprofessional or new co-teacher in every K-3 classroom, every two classrooms (to focus on literacy, tutoring and intervention), or to focus support in Title I schools.
- **Universal PK4:** This was requested or recommended by almost every subcommittee, with commentary related to quality as well as access. There may be some one-time federal funds for structural expansion needs, but there is a request for sustained funds for the increase in students to accommodate waitlists (students aged 4, only). This is also an area that has seen recent expansion in neighboring states such as Texas, Florida, Mississippi, North Carolina, Kentucky, Arkansas, and Alabama.
- **Career Coaches:** There is a great deal of feedback on career coaches for 7th – 9th grade to help guide students to the best high school options. This could be part of the conversation related to counselors, above.
- **Overall Salaries (outside of educators):** There has been some comment related to salary schedules for non-educators. This amount would vary.

Transparency, Accountability and Reporting in the New Framework

Transparency, accountability and reporting are limited under the existing formula for funding. The content listed below outlines information that is relevant to the public in understanding spending and readily available in existing data reports, but not easily accessible, identified or understandable. The new funding framework would include robust reporting requirements utilizing existing and new federally required data.

- **Fiscal Accountability Report:** There are a number of fiscal notes that would be considered on transparent reporting that would be considered. The department would establish a consistent fiscal accountability report to allow the public to review various fiscal indicators.
- **State, District, and School Reporting:** In addition to state and district reporting, school-level information would also be publicly available. This would include school-level per pupil expenditure information, as well as the amount of funding that each school generated in the formula. The reporting would illustrate current data as well as trends over time and with comparable peers.
- **Expenditure and Investment Transparency:** Reporting would include information on resource investments at the district and school levels. Many of the feedback components in public comment included how money should be spent. While a state education funding formula is a funding plan and not a spending plan, it is important that the Tennessee General Assembly and public have clarity and transparency in how those dollars were used, in alignment with student growth.

Next Steps

Tennessee has an opportunity to enhance the funding for K-12 public education to ensure students have the resources they need to succeed and achieve. **The public is encouraged to submit comment on this proposed funding framework by Tuesday, January 18th at noon CT.** Comment can be emailed to tnedu.funding@tn.gov.

On September 30, 2021, the Tennessee Department of Education (department) received a complaint from Teresa Boston that Cumberland County Schools violated law in the administration of education programs under ESSER 3.0. Pursuant to the laws and policies, the department conducted a 45-day investigation of the claims. Based on the investigation, Cumberland County Schools was issued a finding around the requirements for meaningful consultation.

On January 5, 2022, Cumberland County Schools submitted documentation to the department showing that all required action steps outlined in the final finding of fact have been completed. Staff members from the department conducted a thorough review of all submitted documentation. As of January 18, 2022, the ESSER compliant is considered complete and closed.

ESSER COMPLAINT
IN RE: ESSER 3.0 Funds in Cumberland County Schools
MS. TERESA BOSTON | CUMBERLAND COUNTY SCHOOLS
FINDINGS OF FACT

This issue came before the Tennessee Department of Education (department) on Thursday, September 30, 2021, when a Cumberland County resident and Cumberland County Board of Education (CCBOE) member, Ms. Teresa Boston (complainant), submitted a complaint against Dr. Ina Maxwell, Director of Cumberland County Schools, (CCS), claiming that CCS did not give due consideration of the views of appropriate stakeholders, nor did they engage in meaningful consultation with the CCBOE when making budgetary decisions regarding the spending of ESSER 3.0 funds. Ms. Boston filed this complaint as a Cumberland County resident; this complaint was not filed on behalf of or by the CCBOE. This document serves as an official written decision in regard to this complaint.

I. American Rescue Plan Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ARP or ESSER 3.0)

On March 11, 2021, U.S. Congress enacted ARP ESSER, which provided a nearly \$122 billion dollars to states to assist in the safe reopening of schools and sustain the safety and operation of districts. Under the ARP ESSER Interim Final Rule (IFR) released on April 22, 2021, “an LEA must engage in meaningful consultation with stakeholders and give the public an opportunity to provide input in the development of its plan. Specifically, an LEA must engage in meaningful consultation with students; families; school and district administrators (including special education administrators); and teachers, principals, school leaders, other educators, school staff, and their unions. Additionally, an LEA must engage in meaningful consultation with each of the following, to the extent present in or served by the LEA: Tribes; civil rights organizations (including disability rights organizations); and stakeholders representing the interests of children with disabilities, English learners, children experiencing homelessness, children in foster care, migratory students, children who are incarcerated, and other underserved students. An LEA’s decisions about how to use its ARP ESSER funds will directly impact the students, families, and stakeholders in their school district, and thus the LEA’s plans must be tailored to the specific needs faced by students and schools within the district.”

II. Complaint Allegations and Findings of Facts

After receiving the complaint, the department conducted a four-week investigation which included the review of numerous pieces of evidence and documentation as well as interviews with the complainant, Ms. Teresa Boston; the director of schools, Dr. Ina Maxwell; and the chair of the CCBOE, Mr. James Inman. The following statements were provided by the complainant in the written complaint. After reviewing all relevant information related to the complaint, the department now makes the following findings of fact:

- a. Allegation: The ESSER 3.0 Grant application was provided to the Board of Education for approval only six (6) hours prior to our monthly meeting.
 - Finding: The department determined that on Aug 26, 2021 the completed application was emailed to CCBOE members to review approximately eight (8) hours before the scheduled board of education meeting.

- b. Allegation: The Director of Schools has not been transparent or provided sufficient information to the Board of Education in order to make an informed decision regarding the needs assessment process and information.
- Finding: Minutes from CCBOE meetings, email documentation, as well as the interview with Mr. Inman, reflect that Dr. Maxwell provided regular updates about all of the ESSER grants during CCBOE meetings and also invited CCBOE members to meet with her on a number of occasions. Additionally, on July 14, 2021, a stakeholder needs assessment survey was disseminated throughout the community, including to CCBOE members, to gather feedback on potential ESSER spending. Further, on August 20, 2021, Dr. Maxwell shared the survey results with members of the CCBOE via email and also invited school board members to come to her office to review and discuss the data before the final ESSER 3.0 application was submitted. Between August 20 and August 24, 2021, Dr. Maxwell met with the three CCBOE members who accepted her invitation. Interviews conducted show that during these meetings, Dr. Maxwell and the participating CCBOE members discussed the needs assessment and associated data as well as proposed expenditures. In her interview, Ms. Boston stated that she did not accept the August 20 invitation to discuss ESSER 3.0 with Dr. Maxwell.
- c. Allegation: The complainant previously requested information and in reviewing the information and documents provided by the Director of Schools it appears that the Director has relied heavily on the five (5) page survey provided to what she believes are stakeholders.
- Finding: Based on the investigation, this is determined to be true. CCS utilized the survey results as they budgeted their ESSER 3.0 funding.
- d. Allegation: Failure of the Director of Schools (acting as the LEA) to engage stakeholders and working groups in meaningful consultation.
- Finding: While CCS did engage stakeholders to some extent, to ensure meaningful consultation with stakeholders as required by the rule, CCS must increase the percentage of stakeholders engaged.
- e. Allegation: In reviewing one of the surveys provided by the principals, the principal noted “SMHS supports CCHS auditorium” as it has been suggested as an expenditure.
- Finding: Based on the investigation, there is no evidence to support this allegation. Although a principal did write what was stated above, it cannot be proven that this was suggested to them.
- f. Allegation: The failure to engage meaningful consultation from the district as a whole.
- Finding: While CCCS did engage stakeholders to some extent to ensure meaningful consultation with stakeholders as required by the rule, CCS must increase the percentage of stakeholders engaged.
- g. Allegation: When questioned about the ESSER 3.0 Grant Application and the proposed [budget], the Director of Schools would not define where the expenditures derived from, [stating] only that the grant was “needs assessment driven” and no explanation [was given] as to how or where these “needs” came from.

- Finding: Based on the investigation, the department was unable to corroborate this allegation. CCS provided information addressing the data collected from the surveys and the specific feedback from in-person stakeholder meetings to the CCBOE on Aug. 20. Further, as noted in (b) above, Dr. Maxwell also provided the CCBOE an opportunity to discuss the needs assessment results.
- h. Allegation: The quality of the ESSER 3.0 Grant Application is inadequate and vague.
 - Finding: Based on the investigation, this is determined to be a subjective opinion and can only be determined by the department in its review and approval of the ESSER 3.0 application.
- i. Allegation: The ESSER 3.0 Grant Application requirement by the Tennessee Department of Education states that “These diverse stakeholders will have significant insight as to what prevention and mitigation strategies should be pursued.” As a major contributor, Board of Education Member, and stakeholder, the Director of Schools has not provided any information regarding any/all strategies that were possible to be pursued. It has simply not been discussed.
 - Finding: Based on the investigation, the department was unable to corroborate this allegation. As noted above in (b) above, CCS provided updates and information to the CCBOE and invited board members to discuss the results of the needs assessment.
- j. Allegation: That the ESSER 3.0 Grant application requirement states that “LEAs are required to meaningful consult with students, families, schools, district administrators, teachers, principals, school leaders, other educators, school staff, and union.” Upon information and belief that no meaningful consult has been conducted. The five (5) page survey went out to the Cumberland County Teachers Association (which has a membership of approximately 130 members) during the summer months and only thirty-eight (38) responded reflecting that is the only meaningful consult that took place.
 - Finding: The department determined that the ESSER 3.0 stakeholder survey was disseminated to the Cumberland County Teachers Association. However, the survey was also shared with families, elected officials, school and district administrators, special education administrators, school leaders and staff, interest groups, and the teacher union members. It has been noted that CCS will need to re-engage students and families, due to the number of responses gathered in developing the ESSER 3.0 application.
- k. Allegation: While reviewing the documents provided by the Director of Schools, there were drawings and bids that had never been disclosed to any stakeholders during the application process. I had never seen the documents prior to requesting the ESSER 3.0 information.
 - Finding: Based on the investigation, this allegation is determined to be immaterial. The sharing of drawings and bids related to possible expenditures is to be assumed a regular course of business between CCS and CCBOE and no evidence supports a violation of the ARP ESSER Interim Final Rule.
- l. Allegation: That the documents provided and which I reviewed did not reveal any of the following:
 1. Agendas
 2. No public discussion

3. No work sessions with the Board of Education to discuss the results to the surveys or needs assessment results
4. No meaningful consultations with any stakeholders
 - Finding: The department determined that CCS provided documentation of each of these items above to CCBOE as well as other stakeholders. Documentation of this was evident in CCBOE meeting minutes, the CCBOE Budget Committee meeting minutes, as well as the presentations to the CCBOE by Dr. Maxwell. Further, the information related to the work sessions, as well as the data collection from the stakeholder consultation was offered to all CCBOE members to review on August 20, 2021.
- m. Allegation: It is believed that the Director of Schools suggested the needs that she thought best and suggested these to the groups prior to the survey being completed.
 - Finding: The department was unable to corroborate this allegation. No evidence was found that the director provided suggestions to groups prior to the survey.
- n. Allegation: That the survey was vague in its entirety.
 - Finding: Based on the investigation, this is determined to a subjective opinion.
- o. Allegation: That at the August 26, 2021 board of education meeting the Director of Schools failed to disclose to the CCBOE that the ESSER 3.0 Grant funds are entitled funds, giving the CCBOE less than six (6) hours to review and develop any questions regarding the application expenditures, and that if we did not approve the application at this meeting that we would lose the grant funds.
 - Finding: The department determined that Dr. Maxwell provided the CCBOE the completed ESSER 3.0 application and budget via email on the morning of the August 26 CCBOE meeting. The email was sent at 9:39 a.m. and also contained updates to the meeting agenda. CCBOE members had almost a week to review data and information related to the ESSER 3.0 grant. Further, any CCBOE members who had questions related to what would be presented, could have accepted the invitation offered by CCS and participated in discussions at that time. Lastly, Dr. Maxwell did state that CCBOE must approve the application in order to receive the funding from ESSER 3.0. She expressed to the board, "My suggestion is that this application be submitted so that it is submitted, because it would be sad to lose 15 million for this district." The ESSER 3.0 budget was approved by the CCBOE on August 26, 2021.
- p. Allegation: That the District received the ESSER 3.0 Grant Application in May, 2021 and the Director of Schools kept stating that the restrictions and requirements were "ever-changing".
 - Finding: ED's guidance around the ESSER 3.0 changed, and the application was "paused" by the department due to the changes to the law.
- q. Allegation: That I (Ms. Boston) as a stakeholder and Board of Education Member have continuously asked questions regarding the expenditures of the ESSER 3.0 Grant in order to make an informed decision and the Director of Schools continuously failed to provide such information.
 - Finding: Based on the investigation, the department was unable to corroborate this allegation. The department has received numerous copies of emails, CCBOE meeting minutes, CCBOE budgetary meeting minutes and documents that showed adequate proof of response to specific questions asked by the complainant.

- r. Allegation: That the Director of Schools after obtaining her “needs assessment” has failed to comply with Board policies regarding the approval of expenditures of the ESSER 3.0 Grant.
- Finding: This can only be determined by CCS and the CCBOE. However, it should be noted that the CCBOE approved the budget for ESSER 3.0 at the August 26 board meeting. Additionally, the ESSER 3.0 board approval form was signed, acknowledged, on August 27, 2021. The board approval form was submitted into the LEA Document Library on September 20, 2021. If the CCBOE budgetary request failed to comply with the CCBOE policy for approval, then it should be assumed that the CCBOE would not have approved the budget.

III. Investigative Summary

The department has received information from both parties regarding the issues presented. Reviewing the allegations in the complaint, the department would like to express that although each allegation has been addressed for the purpose of clarity on the issues presented in this case, the department is only required to investigate the specific complaints related to the violation of the law. After receiving information regarding the stakeholder engagement process, Ms. Boston has concerns that CCS did not collect enough stakeholder feedback to secure true and adequate data related to the budget for ESSER 3.0, which is approximately 15 million dollars. The department did determine that CCS only received feedback from approximately 2% of students, 7% of families, and 29% of teachers.

Ms. Boston also expresses frustration with the way that information related to ESSER 3.0 has been communicated, specifically related to the approval of the ESSER 3.0 application by the CCBOE on Aug. 26, 2021. This investigation showed that Dr. Maxwell provided information and opportunities for CCBOE members to provide feedback when it came to developing the ESSER 3.0 application as mentioned above. Further, ARP ESSER does not specify that local boards of education should be involved in the application process for ESSER 3.0.

There is insufficient evidence to support the allegations that CCS did not consult with any stakeholders and did not get CCBOE approval for the ESSER 3.0. application. Dr. Maxwell communicated and collaborated with the CCBOE through in-person meetings, email updates, and one-on-one meetings. Meetings included updates on the ESSER 3.0 funding, possible expenditures, budget requirements, and requests for feedback. CCBOE members were invited several times to review the information related to ESSER and provide feedback from March 2021 to August 2021. Ms. Boston declined the opportunity to participate in these meetings and subsequently brought up this complaint after the application was approved by the CCBOE at the August 26, 2021 meeting. The investigation shows that there were numerous opportunities to be more engaged in the process.

However, the department does find that based on the aforementioned information, there is sufficient evidence to support a finding that CCS did not meet the requirement in the ESSER 3.0 regulations that stakeholder engagement be meaningful. Based on the number of responses and the percent of stakeholders that provided feedback during CCS's engagement process, more engagement is needed.

It is important to note, however, that ESSER 3.0 dollars are for emergency purposes in response to COVID-19 and should be treated as such. The purpose of ARP is to “help safely reopen and sustain the safe operation of schools and address the impact of the coronavirus pandemic on the nation’s students.” With this, as Ms. Boston has pointed out, stakeholder engagement is integral to provide the

right resources for the LEA related to the safe operation of schools. As stated in the ESSER 3.0 Interim Final Rule (IFR) released in April 2021, and the ESSER 3.0 application, “With regard to addressing the academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs of all students, particularly those most impacted by the pandemic, we believe that it is critical that LEAs solicit and consider the input of students and their families to identify their most pressing needs. In addition, the Department understands educators and students’ families will have important insights into and observations of students’ academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs garnered from their experiences during the COVID-19 pandemic. Stakeholders will similarly have critical insights into how best to address the academic impact of lost instructional time that LEAs are required to address with at least 20 percent of their ARP ESSER funds. For all of these reasons, through this consultation, LEAs will be better positioned to fully plan to use ARP ESSER funds to adequately respond to the needs of all students, particularly those most impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.”

The IFR was issued by ED to add more detailed requirements and to promote “accountability, transparency, and the effective use of funds.” Moreover, the IFR required LEAs to develop a plan for the use of its ARP ESSER funds, by engaging in meaningful consultation and receiving public input. Following the guidance of the IFR, and after conducting the investigation, the department does have concerns about the level of stakeholder engagement that took place around ESSER 3.0. The department initially addressed this issue in CCS’s ESSER 3.0 application feedback. Once LEAs submit their application, the application is reviewed by the ESSER Funding Relief team at the department who then sends feedback to the LEA. Within CCS’s feedback, the department stated that “student engagement is low compared to total enrollment.” As the purpose of ESSER 3.0 is to assist the whole school district, LEAs have the responsibility to gather as much stakeholder feedback as possible.

IV. Conclusion

To ensure that CCS is awarded and implements ESSER 3.0 according to regulations, the department requires the following:

1. CCS must gather more feedback from students, parents, and families related to ESSER 3.0 and must update their ESSER 3.0 Community Engagement Checklist to reflect that engagement. At a minimum, CCS must provide documentation that they engaged and received feedback from at least 10% of their students and parents/families. At the bottom of the ESSER 3.0 Community Engagement Checklist, the LEA must provide a narrative describing additional outreach and engagement efforts. The updated ESSER 3.0 Community Engagement Checklist along with documentation of engagement activities (surveys, emails, meeting invites, agendas, sign-in sheets, etc.) must be uploaded to the LEA Document Library in ePlan by January 14, 2021.
2. If based on the additional feedback, the results of the needs assessment vary greatly from what was utilized for the initial submission of the ESSER 3.0 application, the LEA should amend the application as appropriate in ePlan.



To improve relations and communications between both constituents, the department recommends the following:

1. CCBOE and CCS should review their expectations and policies, so there is a clear understanding of the steps involved in the budget approval process, including adequate timelines for the exchange of information and for board members to review and challenge information before a budget is brought up for approval.

COMPLAINT APPEAL PROCESS

If the complainant disagrees with the findings of fact, within 10 days of receiving the decision, the complainant may file a written appeal of the findings by emailing the State Ombudsman a Notice of Appeal. The division of federal programs and oversight (FPO) will review the written appeal of the decision, and after consulting with the Chief Districts and Schools Officer, within 45 days the Assistant Commissioner (or designee) of FPO will provide the complainant written notification of the decision. The complainant has the right to request review of the department's decision by the Commissioner of Education and if necessary, the Secretary of the United States Department of Education. The review is at the Secretary's discretion.

Additional Parent/Family Feedback- ESSER 3.0

During the month of November, the district reengaged students for additional feedback. Each school had two grade levels and two classes from those grade levels randomly selected and feedback was gathered using the same feedback instrument as was used in August. With a student enrollment of approximately 7,161 students we have gathered feedback from an additional 971 students bringing total feedback to 1,087 students, which is over 15% of our student population and surpasses the 10% requirement.

In December the original survey was reposted to the district website in order to gain additional feedback from parents/families. The same survey was used and Skylert Remind messages were sent to parents/families on December 10th and 17th. An additional 276 responses were collected bringing the total to 760 parents/families surveyed, which is 10.6% of our families, again surpassing the 10% requirement.

Feedback from both stakeholder groups remained consistent with the feedback gathered in August 2021. The only "top" choice in the feedback from November/December that was not found in the original feedback was tutoring. That will be accounted for in TN All Corp and with the ESSER 3.0 funds that are required to be used to address learning loss.
