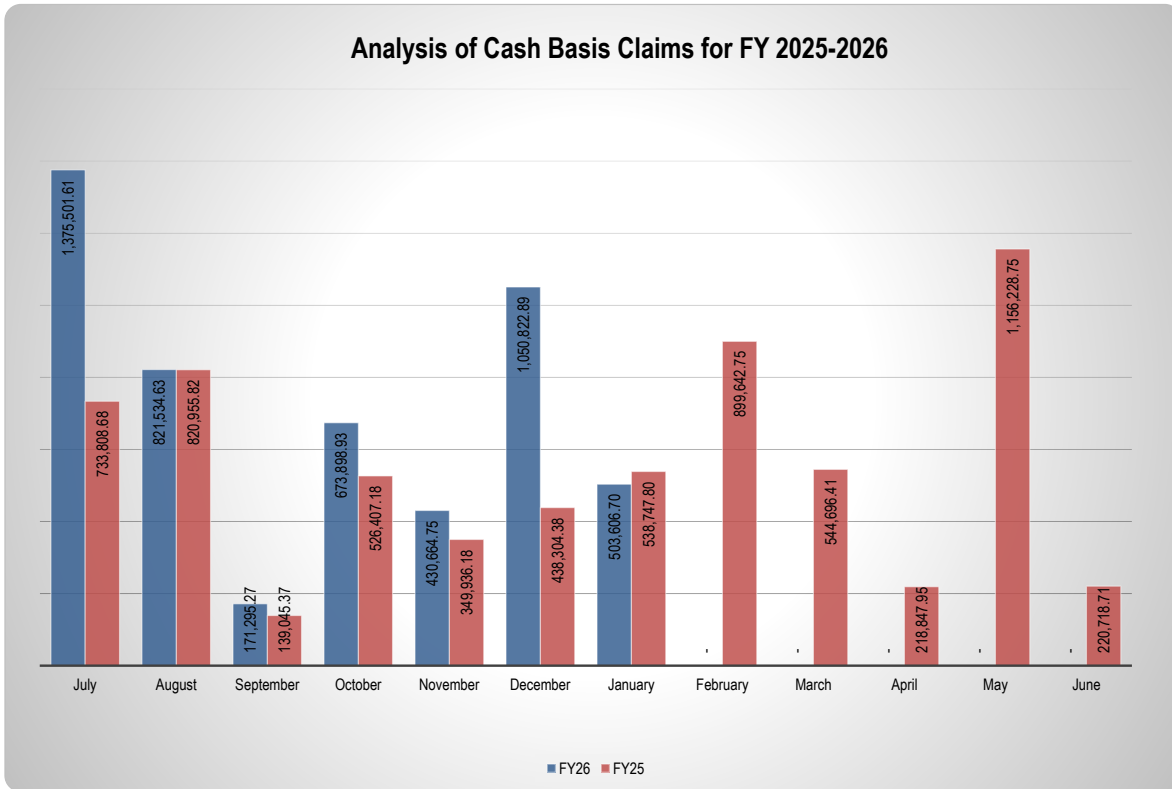

6. REPORTS

A. TN Legislative Update

Board Member Curry presented the proposed **2026 Legislative Agenda**, on the agenda as an action item. Key advocacy priorities include:

- Funding for federally mandated early childhood special education classrooms currently unfunded by the TISA formula
- Opposition to unfunded mandates
- Support for parent choice while opposing the use of public funds for private schools not held to the same accountability standards
- Advocacy for transparency and accountability for any entity receiving taxpayer dollars
- Support for incentives to recruit and retain educators
- Support for allowing ACT or SAT assessments in place of TCAP for grades 9-12

B. Chairman's Report



Chair Griffith reported on Board and district activities during the month, noting Board member participation in numerous district, school, and community events, including the Germantown Holiday Parade; Houston High School and Houston Middle School orchestra, band, and choir concerts; Falcon Footlights productions of *Elf Jr.*; Houston High School theater performances; National Signing Day; athletic events; PTO meetings; and community conversations.

Chair Griffith shared a reflective message on joy, distinguishing it from happiness and emphasizing its deeper, enduring role in education. She noted that joy is often rooted in purpose, connection, growth, and resilience for teachers, students, and parents and extended wishes for a joyful holiday season.

C. Financial Report

Chief Financial Officer Stuart Reckord reported the Total Assets, Liabilities, and Fund Balances on the Balance Sheet for the month ending November 2025.

Health Insurance Fund: Health Claims totaled \$431K for the month versus \$519K budgeted, bringing our YTD total for claims to \$3.5 million. The claim expenses to date represent 56% of the total annual budget.

Cafeteria Fund: SFE is reporting a net income of \$4,015.02 for the year

OPEB Trust Fund: Net realized and unrealized gains on investments totaled \$26K for the month.

D. Superintendent's Report

Superintendent Jason Manuel presented the annual School Safety Report, outlining required safety training for staff and students; layered safety systems including visitor management, threat monitoring, anonymous reporting, and student wellness initiatives; partnerships with the Germantown Police Department, Germantown Fire Department, Methodist Healthcare, and the Tennessee Department of Education; and ongoing facility security improvements. The Superintendent noted the safety plan is publicly available on the district website.

1 A charter school shall be a public, nonsectarian, non-religious school which operates within a public
 2 school district under the terms of a charter agreement and in accordance with Tennessee law. It shall
 3 be subject to all state and federal laws and constitutional provisions prohibiting discrimination on the
 4 basis of disability, race, creed, color, gender, national origin, religion, ancestry or need for special
 5 education services. A charter school shall not exclude students from enrollment based on race, color,
 6 ethnicity, national origin, religion, income level, disability, proficiency in the English language, or
 7 academic ability.

8 A Sponsor of a charter school under Tennessee law means a proposed governing body filing an
 9 application for the establishment of a public charter school that:

- 10 a) Is not a for-profit entity; nonpublic school as defined by T.C.A. § 49-6-3001; other private,
 11 religious, or church school; or postsecondary institution not regionally accredited; and
- 12 b) Does not promote the agendas of any religious denomination or religiously affiliated entity.

13 **APPLICATION PROCESS**

14 A prospective charter school sponsor shall send the GMSD Superintendent and the Tennessee Public
 15 Charter School Commission notice of its intent of its plan to submit an application to operate a charter
 16 school sixty (60) calendar days prior to February 1 of the year preceding the year in which the proposed
 17 charter school plans to begin operation as a public charter school. The letter of intent shall be
 18 completed on the form provided by the TDOE. Failure to submit a letter of intent to the Tennessee
 19 Public Charter School Commission and the GMSD Superintendent by the aforementioned deadline
 20 shall exclude a charter school sponsor from submitting an application for that application cycle. **The**
 21 **GMSD Superintendent/designee shall confirm receipt of the letter of intent and provide the prospective**
 22 **charter school sponsor with current federal, state, and local per pupil funding estimates within five (5)**
 23 **business days of receiving the letter of intent.**

24 The GMSD Superintendent/designee shall determine whether the sponsor has selected the correct
 25 application category within ten (10) business days of receiving the intent letter and notify the sponsor
 26 within five (5) business days of a determination that the incorrect application category has been
 27 selected.

28 One (1) original, four (4) copies and one (1) electronic version of the initial state charter school
 29 application must be received by the GMSD Superintendent on or before 11:59 p.m., central time, on
 30 February 1 of the year preceding the year in which the proposed charter school plans to begin operation

1 as a charter school. The prospective charter school sponsor must use the application form provided
2 by the TDOE. The TDOE and the Tennessee Public Charter School Commission must receive one
3 (1) copy of the application on or before 11:59 p.m., central time, on February 1 of the year preceding
4 the year in which the proposed charter school plans to begin operation as a charter school.
5 Applications will be accepted only between January 1 and February 1. If the 1st of February falls on
6 a Saturday, Sunday, or holiday on which the school district offices are closed, applications will be
7 accepted on the next business day on or before 11:59 p.m. Late applications will not be accepted.
8 Each charter school application must be accompanied by a cashier's check in the amount of Twenty-
9 Five Hundred Dollars (\$2500), per proposed school, as an authorizer non-refundable application fee.

10 The Board shall determine whether an application is complete within ten (10) business days of
11 receiving the application and shall notify the sponsor within five (5) business days of the determination
12 that the application is determined to be incomplete.

13 If the application is approved, the charter school shall follow the GMSD policy regarding out-of-
14 district enrollment.

15 **REVIEW TEAM**

16 If necessary, the GMSD Superintendent shall appoint a charter school review team to assist the
17 Germantown Board of Education in reviewing and evaluating charter school applications and making
18 recommendations to the Germantown Board of Education.

19 The review team shall be comprised of persons with relevant academic, organizational, financial, and
20 legal expertise, as well as a thorough understanding of the essential principles of charter school
21 autonomy and accountability.

22 The charter school review team shall use the most current version of the TDOE "Tennessee Charter
23 School Application Scoring Criteria" for scoring each charter school application.

24 An application shall be considered complete if:

- 25 1. The application is submitted on the Department's state charter application form for that
26 application cycle;
- 27 2. The sponsor has completed all required sections of the application aligned to the category
28 indicated by the sponsor in its letter of intent and the application contains all required
29 attachments and signatures;
- 30 3. The application is submitted to the authorizer by the deadline specified; and
- 31 4. The application fee is submitted with the application.

32 If the charter application is determined to be incomplete due to the sponsor not meeting the
33 requirements of Sections 1 and 3 above, the GMSD Board shall not be required to review the
34 application and the fee shall be refunded to the charter school sponsor.

1 If the charter application is determined to be incomplete due to the sponsor not meeting the
2 requirements of Sections 2 or 4 above, the charter sponsor shall be provided the opportunity to address
3 any deficiencies and re-submit the application within five (5) business days after the notification from
4 GMSD that the application is incomplete. If the sponsor does not correct the deficiencies to meet the
5 requirements of Sections 2 or 4, by the deadline, the GMSD Board shall not be required to review the
6 application and any required application fee shall be refunded to the charter school sponsor.

7 Neither the GMSD charter school review team nor the Germantown Board of Education shall review
8 or formally act upon the application if:

- 9 a) The sponsor did not submit the letters of intent by the required due date;
- 10 b) The application is incomplete; and/or
- 11 c) The application and fee are not submitted to the GMSD Superintendent by “the filing
12 deadline”.

13 APPROVAL OR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

14 The Germantown Board of Education shall rule by resolution, at a regular or special called meeting,
15 on the approval or denial of a charter application within ninety (90) calendar days of receipt of the
16 completed application or the application shall be deemed approved by law. If the GMSD Board of
17 Education fails to approve or deny a charter school application within the ninety (90) calendar day
18 time period, the charter school application shall be deemed approved.

19 A cyber-based public charter school shall not be authorized.

20 No later than ten (10) calendar days after the approval or denial of a charter school application, the
21 Germantown Board of Education shall report to the TDOE and the Tennessee Public Charter School
22 Commission whether the Germantown Board of Education approved or denied the application. The
23 Germantown Board of Education shall simultaneously provide the TDOE and the Tennessee Public
24 Charter School Commission with a copy of the aforementioned resolution setting forth the
25 Germantown Board of Education decision and the reasons for the Germantown Board of Education’s
26 decision.

27 An approval by the Germantown Board of Education shall be accompanied by a written Agreement
28 which shall contain all components of the application. The Agreement shall be signed by the sponsor
29 and the Germantown Board of Education Executive Committee Members and the Agreement shall be
30 binding upon the governing body of the charter school. The term of the Agreement shall be ten (10)
31 academic years.

32 The Germantown Board of Education hereby adopts the Tennessee State Board of Education’s Quality
33 Charter Authorizing Standards.

34 Within ten (10) calendar days of the date of the decision to deny, the grounds upon which the
35 Germantown Board of Education based a decision to deny a charter school application must be stated
36 in writing, specifying objective reasons for the denial and the deadline by which the charter school
37 sponsor must submit an amended application.

1 Upon receipt of the grounds for denial, the sponsor shall have thirty (30) calendar days from receipt
2 of the grounds for denial, within which to submit an amended application to correct the deficiencies.
3 The Germantown Board of Education shall have sixty (60) calendar days from receipt of the amended
4 application, either to deny or to approve the amended application or the application shall be deemed
5 approved by law.

6 If the Germantown Board of Education fails to approve or deny the amended application within sixty
7 (60) calendar days from the receipt of the amended application, the amended application shall be
8 deemed approved. If the Germantown Board of Education denies the amended application, it shall
9 provide to the charter school sponsor the grounds upon which the Germantown Board of Education
10 based the decision to deny in writing within five (5) calendar days of the date of the decision to deny,
11 specifying objective reasons for the denial.

12 **RENEWAL**

13 No later than April 1 of the year prior to the year in which the charter agreement expires, the governing
14 body of a public charter school shall submit a renewal application to the Germantown Board of
15 Education. The GMSD Superintendent shall report each renewal application received by GMSD to
16 the Tennessee Public Charter School Commission no later than ten (10) days from the date on which
17 GMSD received the renewal application. On or before the following February 1, the Germantown
18 Board of Education shall rule by resolution whether to approve or deny the renewal application.

19 Three (3) months prior to the date on which a charter school is required to submit a renewal
20 application, the GMSD Superintendent/designee shall submit to the charter school a performance
21 report that reflects the renewal evaluation. No later than ten (10) days after the Germantown Board of
22 Education adopts a resolution to renew or deny renewal of a charter agreement, the GMSD
23 Superintendent/designee shall report the GMSD Board's decision to the TDOE and the Tennessee
24 Public Charter School Commission and shall provide a copy of the resolution that sets forth the
25 Germantown Board of Education's decision and the reasons for the decision.

26 A charter school renewal application must contain a report of the charter school's operations including
27 students' standardized test scores, financial statements, and audits for the eight (8) years immediately
28 preceding the date of the renewal application.

29 **AUTHORIZER FEE**

30 If GMSD becomes the authorizer of a charter school, GMSD shall receive an annual authorizer fee
31 that is a percentage of the charter school's per student state and local funding as allocated under T.C.A.
32 § 49-13-112. The annual authorizer fee shall be the lesser of three percent (3%) of the annual per
33 student state and local allocations or Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000) per school.

34 **INTERIM REVIEW**

35 The GMSD Superintendent or his designee shall conduct an interim review of the charter school in
36 the fifth year of the charter school's initial period of operation and in the fifth year following any
37 renewal of a charter agreement under guidelines developed by the Tennessee State Board of Education.

1 ANNUAL REPORT

2 The GMSD Board, through the GMSD Superintendent/designee, shall oversee and annually evaluate
3 each charter school to ensure it meets the performance standards and targets set forth in the charter
4 school agreements. The GMSD Superintendent/designee shall submit the charter school's evaluation
5 to the GMSD Board at its October Board Meeting.

6 The GMSD Superintendent/designee shall send a copy of the charter school's annual evaluation to
7 each respective charter school within the GMSD's borders. Said report shall include, but not be limited
8 to, violations of the charter school agreement and any performance deficiencies.

9 The GMSD Board shall articulate and enforce stated consequences for failing to meet performance
10 expectations or compliance requirements.

11 SITE VISITS

12 A site visit to each charter school shall be conducted by the GMSD Superintendent/designee annually.
13 The purpose shall be to collect data and other qualitative information and to inspect the charter school
14 facility and observe classroom teaching and learning. The observations made during the annual site
15 visit shall be included in the annual charter school evaluation report.

16 CHARTER SCHOOL REPORTING

17 Charter schools shall provide the information required by the charter school agreement and state law
18 to the GMSD Board.

19 By September 1st, the governing body of an approved charter school shall make a written report to the
20 GMSD Board. The annual report shall include:

- 21 1. A report on the progress of the charter school in achieving the goals outlined in the charter
22 school agreement;
- 23 2. A financial statement disclosing the financial health of the charter school, including the costs
24 of the administration, instruction, and other spending categories of the charter school; and
- 25 3. A detailed accounting, including the amounts and sources, of all funds received by the charter
26 school, other than the funds received per state law.

27 This reporting requirement shall begin in the year after the year in which the charter school begins
28 operation.

29 Multiple charter schools overseen by a single governing board shall report their performance as
30 separate, individual charter schools. Each charter school shall be independently accountable for its
31 performance.

32 Each charter school governing body shall submit an annual audit of all accounts and records, to include
33 internal school activity and cafeteria funds, to the GMSD Board as soon as practical after June 30th.

1 **AUTHORIZER REPORTING AND REVIEW**

2 By December 1st, the GMSD Superintendent shall report to the Tennessee State Board of Education
3 detailing the total amount of authorizer fees collected in the previous school year and the authorizing
4 obligations fulfilled using the fee. By January 1st, the GMSD Board shall submit an annual authorizer
5 report to the Tennessee Department of Education and the State Board of Education. The GMSD
6 Superintendent/designee shall prepare the reports and provide the information to the GMSD Board
7 prior to submission.

8 **CHARTER AGREEMENT**

9 The Germantown Board of Education's approval of a public charter school application must be in the
10 form of a written charter agreement signed by the charter school sponsor and the Germantown Board
11 of Education, which shall be binding upon the governing body of the charter school. The charter
12 agreement must be in writing and must contain all material components of the approved application
13 required by Tennessee law. A charter agreement expires ten (10) academic years after the first day of
14 instruction.

15 **REVOCAION OF CHARTER AGREEMENT**

16 The Germantown Board of Education may revoke a public charter school agreement if the public
17 charter school receives identification as a priority school, as defined by the state's accountability
18 system pursuant to T.C.A. § 49-1-602. The revocation takes effect immediately following the close of
19 the school year in which the public charter school is identified as a priority school.

20 The Germantown Board of Education shall revoke a public charter school agreement if the public
21 charter school receives identification as a priority school for two (2) consecutive cycles. The
22 revocation takes effect immediately following the close of the school year in which the public charter
23 school is identified as a priority school for the second consecutive cycle.

24 A public charter school agreement may be revoked at any time by the Germantown Board of
25 Education, if the Germantown Board of Education determines that the school:

- 26 (1) Committed a material violation of any conditions, standards, or procedures set forth in the
27 charter agreement;
- 28 (2) Failed to meet or make sufficient progress toward the performance expectations set forth in the
29 charter agreement; or
- 30 (3) Failed to meet generally accepted standards of fiscal management.

31
32 If the GMSD Superintendent determines that the charter school meets the criterion for revocation set
33 forth above, or if the GMSD Superintendent determines that the charter school is not complying with
34 the requirements of T.C.A. § 49-13-101, *et seq.*, (The Tennessee Public Charter School Act) or with
35 the charter agreement:

- 36 (1) The GMSD Superintendent shall notify the charter school, in writing, of the possibility of
37 revocation and the reasons for the possible revocation. In the notification to the charter
38 school, the GMSD Superintendent shall notify the charter school that the charter school must

1 provide GMSD's review team with a proposed plan to remediate the charter school's
2 deficiencies which gave rise to the notice of possible revocation.

3 (2) The charter school shall submit a written remediation plan to the GMSD review team within
4 thirty (30) days of receiving the notice of possible revocation. The remediation plan shall
5 provide that the remediation itself shall be completed within thirty (30) days of submission
6 of the remediation plan. The GMSD review team shall notify the charter school within
7 twenty (20) business days of receiving the proposed remediation plan of whether the
8 remediation plan is acceptable to the review team.

9 (3) If the proposed remediation plan does not, in the sole discretion of the GMSD review team,
10 provide a full remediation, the GMSD review team shall, within thirty (30) business days of
11 receiving the remediation plan, notify the charter school that the remediation plan is
12 unacceptable and an explanation of the means to reconcile the plan is unacceptable. The
13 charter school shall be given ten (10) business days to correct the proposed remediation plan
14 and re-submit the plan to the GMSD review team. The GMSD review team shall notify the
15 charter school within thirty (30) business days of the re-submission whether the re-submitted
16 plan is acceptable to the review team.

17 (4) If the charter school's re-submitted proposed remediation plan is rejected by the GMSD
18 review team, the charter school may appeal the decision to the GMSD Superintendent. The
19 GMSD Superintendent may, within thirty (30) business days of receiving the re-submission:

20 (a) Approve the re-submission; or

21 (b) Provide the charter school with an additional ten (10) business days to further amend
22 the remediation plan; or

23 (c) Reject the re-submission.

24 (5) If the re-submission is rejected by the GMSD Superintendent, the charter school may appeal
25 the GMSD Superintendent's decision to the GMSD Board of Education within ten (10)
26 business days after receiving notice of the rejection. The GMSD Board shall consider the
27 re-submission within thirty (30) business days of receiving the appeal of the rejection. The
28 GMSD Board shall provide the charter school with a decision regarding the re-submission,
29 in writing, explaining the reasons the proposed plan is unacceptable.

30 *A charter agreement may be revoked at any time by the authorizer in an emergency situation without
31 the authorizer first having to implement the progressive intervention policy. An emergency situation
32 includes, but is not limited to, instances of fraud; misappropriation of funds; flagrant violation of health
33 and safety laws, rules, and regulations; flagrant disregard of the charter agreement; or similar
34 misconduct.

35 Thirty (30) days prior to any decision by the Germantown Board of Education to revoke a charter
36 agreement, the Germantown Board of Education shall notify the charter school in writing of the
37 possibility of revocation and the reasons for such possible revocation.

-
- 1 If the Germantown Board of Education revokes a charter agreement, then it shall clearly state in
 - 2 writing the reasons for the revocation.
 - 3 No later than ten (10) days after the Germantown Board of Education adopts a resolution to revoke a
 - 4 charter agreement, the Germantown Board of Education shall report the Germantown Board of
 - 5 Education’s decision to the TDOE and the Tennessee Public Charter School Commission and shall
 - 6 provide a copy of the resolution that sets forth the Germantown Board of Education’s decision and the
 - 7 reasons for the decision.

1 Substitute teachers are those used to replace teachers on leave or to fill temporary vacancies. Substitute
2 teachers may be employed and paid directly by the Germantown Municipal School District or by a third
3 party public or private employer.

4 APPLICATION/QUALIFICATIONS

5 1. All substitute teachers shall submit a fingerprint sample and pass a criminal history background
6 check conducted by the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation and the Federal Bureau of Investigation prior
7 to performing any work or service on behalf of GMSD and every five (5) years thereafter.

8 2. Persons with an educator license or certificate in the State of Tennessee or another state which is
9 in a revoked or suspended status may not work as a substitute teacher in any GMSD school.

10 3. All substitute teachers shall be required to receive the annual school safety training required by
11 T.C.A. § 49-6-805(7) and any other instruction on emergency response required by the
12 Superintendent/Designee.

13 4. Other qualifications for substitute teachers shall be determined by the Superintendent in
14 compliance with state laws and regulations.

15 CERTIFICATION

16 After the regular teacher has been absent for **thirty (30)** ~~twenty (20)~~ consecutive days of approved leave,
17 the person serving as the substitute must be licensed and hold the appropriate endorsement for the
18 assignment or must be a retired teacher and have held the appropriate endorsement. After the regular
19 teacher's accumulated leave is exhausted, the replacement teacher must be licensed and hold the
20 appropriate endorsement for the assignment or be a retired teacher and have held the appropriate
21 endorsement and must be paid based on the replacement teacher's training and experience record in
22 accordance with the state and local salary schedules.

23 EMERGENCY NEEDS

24 All teacher aides, secretaries and clerks are approved to work as substitute teachers in emergency
25 situations. Emergency use shall be defined as less than a full day due to the regular or substitute teacher
26 being unable to arrive on time or remain the full day.

1 Said substitutes shall receive the proportionate equivalent salary regular substitute teachers would
2 receive under similar circumstances or their regular salary, if higher; however, they shall not receive pay
3 for both positions at the same time.

4 **TRAINING AND ORIENTATION**

5 The Superintendent/Designee shall be responsible for ensuring that substitute teachers have received
6 appropriate training prior to serving as a substitute teacher.

7 **RESPONSIBILITIES**

8 Substitute teachers shall assume the same responsibilities as the regular teacher, including, but not
9 limited to, bus duty and playground supervision.

1 **GMSD EMPLOYEES**

2 **GMSD employees who incur expenses in carrying out the duties of their jobs will be reimbursed,**
3 **provided that the expenditures have been pre-approved. In order to be reimbursed for travel**
4 **expenses incurred in carrying out the employee's job duties, employees are required to comply**
5 **with the GMSD Travel Procedure.**

6 **BOARD MEMBERS**

7 **The members of the GMSD Board shall be reimbursed for transportation, lodging, meals, and other**
8 **pertinent expenses when traveling on Board business, provided that the Board Member submits**
9 **the request for reimbursement on a form approved by the District, and the request is within the**
10 **Board's operational budget.**

Course Justification:

Facing History & Ourselves has long been part of our social studies curriculum. For almost 50 years, Facing History and Ourselves has taken a student-centered approach to teaching and learning which has been applied to the cultivation of this academically rigorous course which directly aligns to Tennessee

Academic Standards in Social Studies and English Language Arts. This unique Facing History elective course uses an in-depth case-study approach with a focus on two pivotal moments in history: the Holocaust and the Armenian Genocide, and it is designed to develop students' historical understanding, literacy, and communication skills. This course utilizes innovative college level preparatory pedagogy and teaching strategies, several of which support current social studies practices embedded within the TN Academic Standards for social studies courses.

Course curriculum includes the use of both informational text and content related literature, along with informational and argumentative writing. Course pedagogy relies heavily on methods of the humanities--inquiry, analysis, and interpretation--to promote the knowledge, agency, and the 21st Century skills needed to preserve and protect democracy. The distinct interdisciplinary approach of this social studies course likewise aligns with Tennessee English Language Arts Standards.

The Facing History Course achieves these standards by providing primary and secondary resources and mediated texts that are complex and ask students to struggle productively, yet the design of the lessons allow for students to expand, strengthen, and develop a strong academic vocabulary as they consider a word or phrase important to comprehension or synthesis. Each lesson includes general academic and content related, domain specific words and phrases, supported by a glossary of over 175 terms. The strategies implemented in each lesson emphasize continued vocabulary growth and literacy skill development as students

engage in analyzing what a text says explicitly, drawing logical inferences, and citing textual evidence to support conclusions in collaborative discussions that promote students' ability to listen carefully and build on peer input, as well as write arguments to support claims with clear reasons and relevant evidence. The lessons in the course curriculum promote the integration of information presented in different media or formats, such as tables, images, film, diagrams, and text, to develop a coherent understanding of a topic or issue. The included readings, primary and secondary source documents, and their accompanying lesson plans are designed to build comprehension skills utilizing a text complexity designed for grades 9 - 12, with a gradual release of scaffolding at the high end as needed.

Facing History and Ourselves offers an important elective opportunity for students to reinforce and further develop reading, critical thinking, and writing skills by analyzing & synthesizing information from multiple informational, historical, and literary sources, which serves to reinforce the generalization of these skills across the curriculum.

Course Description:

The Facing History high school elective course guides teachers and their students through a Facing History and Ourselves case study approach to two pivotal moments in history: the Holocaust and the Armenian Genocide. Facing History courses approach the learning of history through the examination of human behavior and the impact of choices on historical outcomes. This course curriculum is designed to support students through the process of identifying universal themes among historical events, while learning to recognize the specific context and particular choices that make every event unique. The ultimate goal is for students to develop their ability to connect the past to the present and make informed choices in the future.

The included primary and secondary resources and the argumentative writing assessment have been selected and sequenced to foster students' historical thinking, reading, writing, and communication skills.

Throughout this course, students will:

- Expand their proficiency in critical thinking, argumentative and reflective writing, reading comprehension, inquiry, self-discipline, and responsible decision-making.
- Build their capacity for historical understanding and making historical connections
- Analyze a wide variety of primary and secondary sources, increasing their ability to describe, select, interpret, and evaluate relevant historical evidence.
- Contextualize the individual and collective choices that impacted the Holocaust and the Armenian Genocide and synthesize the ways that the legacies of
- history connect with contemporary events and the decisions we make in our own lives.
- Develop their leadership skills and competencies to communicate effectively, listen actively, use evidence to support their ideas, work with others, problem
- solve, demonstrate compassion, and negotiate conflict constructively.
- Be empowered to think deeply about their role and responsibility to actively participate in democracy, society, and civic life.

Course Development:

The Facing History and Ourselves Elective course draws from the content and methodology of Facing History and Ourselves, Inc. an international educational non-profit founded in 1976, which focuses on high quality curriculum and teacher professional development. Facing History's mission is to challenge teachers and their students to use the lessons of history to stand up to bigotry and hate. This course has been approved as a special course in TN for the past 20 years.

This Facing History Elective Course was developed in 2001 by Facing History staff and public school teachers as a humanities based history course in Memphis, TN. The course was approved by the Tennessee Department of Education in 2002 and was piloted by 2 schools (Whitehaven and Ridgeway High School). Shortly thereafter, a study by Harvard University demonstrated that the Facing History and Ourselves content and pedagogy increases social competence skills, including the student's ability to understand the point of view of others, to listen well to peers, and to be active participants in promoting democratic practices.

Since 2002 the course has been consistently aligned to the most current TN Social Studies Academic Standards, as well as, regularly updated to reflect the most up-to-date historical scholarship and evidence. Each year more administrators and teachers request the opportunity to offer an elective course that will enable them to more deeply explore with their students the issues raised through the Facing History curriculum. The course is now taught in over 40 Tennessee high schools (public, private, charter, and parochial) in Memphis, Frayser and the greater Shelby County area, including Germantown, Collierville, Millington; additionally this course curriculum is used in high schools in Nashville and Chattanooga.
