1 *General*

2 Lakeland School System will follow the procurement procedures established by the Board of
3 Commissioners of the City of Lakeland with the exception of our higher competitive bid threshold of
4 ~~\$25,000~~ \$50,000.

5 The school system will purchase competitively and seek maximum educational value for every dollar
6 expended. Authorization to purchase shall be provided by the Board. ~~The superintendent or finance~~
7 ~~director shall serve as purchasing agent for system-wide purchasing.~~ The finance office shall assign an
8 individual to the role of purchasing agent for system-wide purchasing.¹ Principals shall serve as
9 purchasing agents for individual schools.

10 Purchases made by anyone not authorized by the appropriate officials shall become the personal
11 responsibility of the persons making the purchase agreement. The Board will not, under any
12 circumstances, be responsible for payment for any materials, supplies, or services purchased by
13 unauthorized individuals or in an un-prescribed manner.

14 No school shall be obligated to pay for any expenditure made by a student or a teacher or by any other
15 employee unless he/she first receives a written purchase order from the proper office or unless prior
16 written permission or arrangements are made with the principal.

17 The Board shall purchase locally whenever the conditions are comparable or when it is most practical
18 under the circumstances.

19 *Individual Schools*

20 The superintendent must approve the following purchases:

- 21 1. a single piece of equipment costing more than five thousand dollars (\$ 5,000.00);
- 22 2. one that is to be attached to or one that requires alteration of the building; or
- 23 3. one that will become a permanent fixture.

24 *Central Office*²

25 **ROUTINE PURCHASES**

26 Routine purchases shall include expenditures for supplies, salaries, and routine expenditures required
27 for the operation of the school system. These expenditures shall be anticipated and provided for in the

1 budget and will normally be authorized by the Board at the beginning of the fiscal year. The
2 superintendent or his/her designee shall make all routine purchases without further Board
3 authorization; however, the Board shall be promptly informed if any substantial variation from
4 budgeted estimates occurs or becomes necessary.

5 **SPECIAL PURCHASES**

6 Special purchases are those which are not routine and which may or may not be specifically identified
7 by line item in the budget. Examples of special purchases are all capital expenditures such as for
8 vehicles, buildings, major contracts, purchases of major equipment, items for long-term use and
9 supplies of an unusual quantity or nature. All purchases in this category shall require specifications
10 prior Board approval. Items such as furniture, fixtures, and equipment for major construction projects
11 may be approved as a general budget category in the capital projects budget. In its approval, the Board
12 may place constraints on the superintendent requiring Board evaluation and/or approval at various
13 steps in the procurement process. This will be determined by the Board on an individual basis
14 depending on the nature of the procurement action.

15 **EMERGENCY PURCHASES**

16 Emergency purchases are those which are necessary to avert hazards which threaten health or safety, to
17 protect property from damage or to avoid major disruption of educational activities. If within
18 budgetary limits and deemed essential, emergency purchases may be made by the superintendent.
19 However, if the purchase is of such significant magnitude as to impact on the integrity of the budget,
20 the chairman shall call a special or emergency meeting of the Board to deal with the matter. In any
21 event, the Board shall be advised promptly of all emergency purchases.

22 **PURCHASING OF SURPLUS PROPERTY**

23 The superintendent and other employees designated by the Board shall be authorized to act for the
24 Board in acquiring federal surplus property through the Tennessee General Services Department for
25 surplus property and in entering into agreements, certifications and covenants of compliance
26 concerning the use of federal surplus property.

27 Further, the superintendent is authorized to purchase any needed items through suppliers approved on
28 the state bid list.

29 **COOPERATIVE PURCHASING³**

30 The Board, at its option, will join in cooperative purchasing with other school systems to take
31 advantage of lower prices for bulk purchasing and to reduce the cost involved in bidding whenever
32 such buying appears to be to the benefit of the system.

33 **ONLINE PURCHASING**

34 The Board recognizes that online purchasing may provide opportunities for savings, but extra
35 precaution should be used to ensure that accounting procedures are followed. Online purchasing shall
36 be permitted with the following requirements:

- 1 1. Prior authorization must be obtained from the superintendent before setting up new online
2 accounts, and schools shall maintain a list of accounts.
- 3 2. Online purchases must be for school purposes and made in accordance with established policies
4 and procedures. School employees are prohibited from making personal purchases even with
5 the intent of reimbursing the school system. School employees are prohibited from using a
6 school's tax exempt status for personal purchases of any kind.⁴
- 7 3. The availability of money for the fund/account in question should be determined before
8 Purchase Orders are approved.
- 9 4. All Purchase Orders must be properly filled out and approved prior to a purchase.
- 10 5. Price quotes should be obtained where possible and/or practical and retained with other
11 purchase documentation.

12 PURCHASING WITH FEDERAL GRANT FUNDS

13 Before grant funds are obligated or expended, the superintendent or his designee shall review the cost
14 of a proposed expenditure and determine if it is an allowable use of federal grant funds.⁵ The
15 superintendent will minimize the time that elapses between the transfer and disbursement of funds
16 once an expenditure is approved.

17 No person officially connected with or employed by the school system may participate in the selection,
18 award, or administration of a contract supported by a federal award if he or she has a real or apparent
19 conflict of interest. A real or apparent conflict of interest arises when the employee, officer, or agent,
20 any member of his or her immediate family, his or her partner, or an organization which employs or is
21 about to employ any of the parties indicated herein, has a financial or other interest in or a tangible
22 personal benefit from a firm considered for a contract. Upon discovery of any potential conflict, the
23 superintendent shall disclose the potential conflict to the federal awarding agency in writing.⁶

1 A Disciplinary Hearing Authority (DHA) shall conduct appeals for students who have been suspended
2 for more than ten (10) school days. The Board shall appoint members to the DHA which shall consist of
3 three (3) members, (maximum number must not exceed total membership of Board). The Superintendent
4 shall recommend members of the DHA to the Board for approval. At least one (1) DHA member shall
5 be a licensed employee of the district, and such appointments are for one (1) year terms and subject to
6 reappointment. Board members shall not serve on the DHA.¹

7 The superintendent shall appoint a Chair of the DHA from the members appointed by the Board. The
8 Chair shall perform the following duties:

- 9
- 10 1. Set the time, place and date for each hearing;
- 11
- 12 2. Maintain order and structure during each hearing; and
- 13
- 14 3. Prepare, sign, and disseminate the minutes of each meeting.

15 Upon receiving notification of the request to appeal the suspension decision, the DHA shall provide
16 written notification to the parent or guardian of the student, the student, and any other appropriate person
17 of the time, place and date of the hearing. The hearing must be held no later than ten (10) working days
18 after the beginning of the suspension.²

19
20 The DHA may take the following disciplinary actions:³

- 21 1. Affirm the decision of the school principal;
- 22 2. Order removal of the suspension unconditionally;
- 23 3. Order removal of the suspension upon such terms and conditions as it deems reasonable;
- 24 4. Assign the student to an alternative program; or
- 25 5. Suspend the student for a specified period of time.*

26 Within five (5) working days of the DHA rendering a decision, the student, Principal, Principal-Teacher
27 or Assistant Principal may request a review by the ~~Board~~ Superintendent, and the ~~Board shall review the~~
28 ~~record~~ Superintendent may exercise any disciplinary authority granted to the DHA in responding to such
29 an appeal. Within (5) working days of the Superintendent rendering a decision, the student, principal,

1 principal-teacher or assistant principal may request a review by the Board, and the Board shall review
2 the record. Following the review, the Board may take the following actions.

3 *Grant Request for Hearing*⁴

4 If the Board grants a hearing, it shall provide notice to the student and/or his/her parent(s)/guardian(s).
5 The notice of the hearing shall include a statement that, unless the student or the student's
6 parent(s)/guardian(s) requests an open hearing in writing within five (5) working days of receipt of the
7 notice, the hearing shall be closed to the public.

8 The Board may affirm, overturn, or modify the decision of the DHA.

9 *Deny Request for Hearing*⁴

10 If the Board does not grant a hearing, it may affirm, overturn, or modify the decision of the DHA. The
11 Board shall not impose a more severe penalty than that imposed by the DHA without first providing an
12 opportunity for a hearing before the Board.

13 *** Note: Zero-tolerance offenses as set forth in statute require mandatory calendar year expulsion or**
14 **assignment to alternative placement for a calendar year unless modified by the superintendent.**
