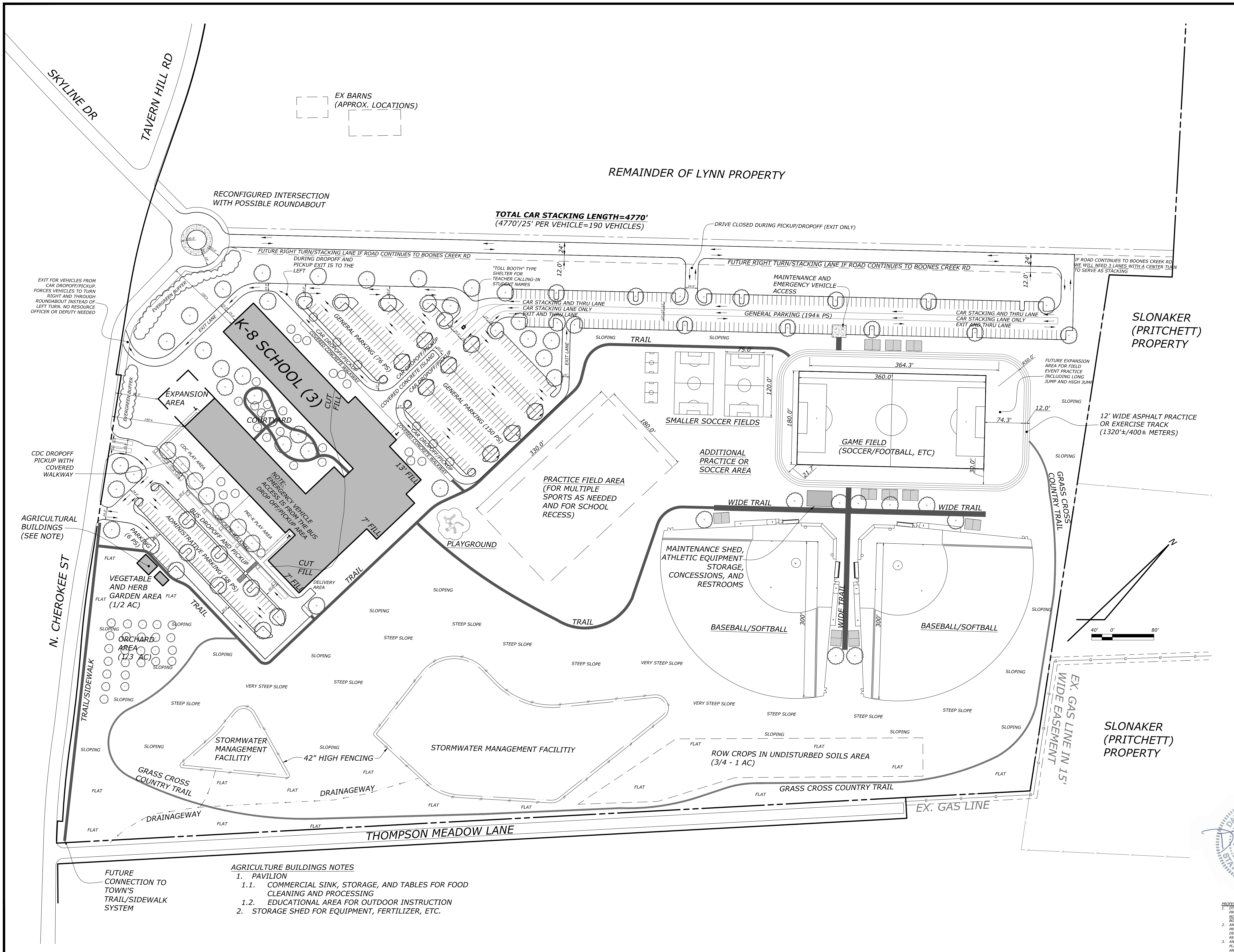

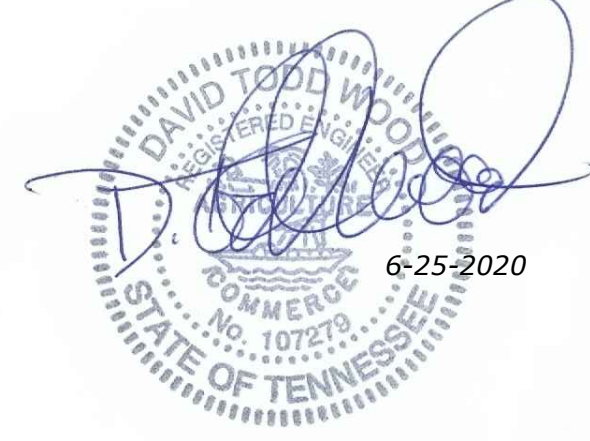

- 1 All uses of tobacco **products**, ~~electronic/battery-operated devices~~, vapor products, and all other  
 2 associated paraphernalia are prohibited on all district property and in all vehicles that are owned,  
 3 leased, or operated by the district. ~~1. Smoking and vaping shall be prohibited in any public seating~~  
 4 ~~areas including, but not limited to, bleachers used for sporting events or public restrooms.~~ ~~2. Use~~  
 5 ~~of the aforementioned products shall be expressly prohibited in any public seating areas,~~  
 6 ~~including but not limited to, bleachers used for sporting events and public restrooms.~~ <sup>2</sup>
- 7 District employees and students in the school district will not be permitted to use **the aforementioned**  
 8 ~~these~~ products while they are participants in any class or activity in which they represent the school  
 9 district.
- 10 Signs will be posted throughout the district's facilities to notify students, employees, and all other  
 11 persons visiting the school that the use of **the aforementioned these** products is forbidden.
- 12 The following notice shall be prominently posted (including at each ticket booth) for elementary or  
 13 secondary school sporting events: *This is a tobacco-free campus. All uses of tobacco products, vapor*  
 14 *products, and all other associated paraphernalia including vaping is prohibited by law in seating*  
 15 *areas and in restrooms.* ~~3. on school property at all times.~~ <sup>3</sup> *This policy shall be in effect whether or not*  
 16 *school is in session.*

1 *General*

2 The following guidelines shall be followed:<sup>1</sup>

- 3 1. Fundraising activities shall be authorized by the Board and shall be for the purpose of  
4 supplementing funds for established school programs and not for replacing funds which are the  
5 responsibility of the Board.
- 6 2. Fundraising companies and other salespersons shall obtain permission in writing from the  
7 Director of Schools' office in order to visit the schools.
- 8 3. Any commission payable by companies shall be paid in the form of reduced prices to the  
9 students or paid into the activity fund of the school for use by the school. No school employee  
10 shall personally benefit from any fundraising activity.
- 11 4. The principal shall obtain written approval from the Director of Schools/designee for all  
12 fundraising activities, including online fundraising activities that involve the participation of  
13 the general student population in the marketing process of the fundraising effort. All other  
14 fundraising activities, including online fundraising activities, shall have written approval from  
15 the principal and comply with all administrative procedures issued by the Director of Schools.  
16 The authorization request shall contain the following information:<sup>2</sup>
- 17 a. A list of the proposed fundraising activities;
- 18 b. Purpose of the fundraising activity;
- 19 c. Proposed uses of funds raised;
- 20 d. Present balance of affected fund and/or accounts;
- 21 e. Expected student involvement in fundraising activity (school-wide, individual class, or  
22 club); and
- 23 f. Margin of profit and how it is to be paid to the school.
- 24 5. The Director of Schools shall determine whether or not the activity will benefit the school,  
25 contribute to the welfare of the student body, and supplement, not replace, funds necessary to  
26 fulfill the Board's required contributions.

1       6. Students shall not be excused from a regular class to participate in a fundraising activity. No  
2       grade in a subject or course shall be affected by a student's participation in a fundraising  
3       activity.

4       7. No quotas shall be imposed on students involved, and their efforts shall be voluntary. Students  
5       who do not participate in fundraising activities shall not be punished or discriminated against in  
6       any way.

7       This policy shall not be construed as preventing a teacher from using instructional or informational  
8       materials even though the materials might include reference to a brand, a product, or a service.

## 9       **LOTTERIES**

10      No fundraising activity shall be conducted which distributes prizes or makes awards to winners from  
11      among purchasers of chances by means of tickets through a random selection process.<sup>3</sup>

## 12     **ONLINE FUNDRAISING**

13      Individual schools may establish school-wide online fundraising accounts. The accounts shall meet all  
14      fundraising requirements established by the Board and the *Tennessee Internal School Uniform*  
15      *Accounting Policy Manual*. The principal/designee of each school shall have access to the established  
16      fundraising account to ensure all funds are properly accounted for, and the information is recorded in  
17      the school's accounting records by the designated personnel. Online fundraising shall not be used on  
18      behalf and for the benefit of an outside party.

19      An employee shall not engage in online fundraising for educational purposes in his/her official  
20      capacity as a district employee or make any reference to non-school sponsored fundraisers, online or  
21      otherwise, that would lead another to believe such activity is an approved school fundraiser.

## 22     **FUNDRAISING FOR NONEDUCATIONAL PURPOSES<sup>4</sup>**

23      On approval of the Director of School or his/her designee, an employee may be authorized to raise and  
24      use funds for the following noneducational purposes **for the benefit of the faculty and staff:**

- 25       1. Bereavement support;
- 26       2. Award recognition;
- 27       3. Employee morale;
- 28       4. Banquets; or
- 29       5. Other situations at the principal's discretion.
- 30

1 These funds shall be derived from **faculty lounge** vending machine revenue, donations, or other  
2 funding sources subject to the approval of the Director of Schools. ~~Vending machine revenue can~~  
3 ~~only be used for activities that directly benefit students.~~

4 The Director of Schools shall develop administrative procedures regarding the receipt, disbursement,  
5 accounting, and auditing of these noneducational funds. The Director of Schools shall ensure that the  
6 procedures are consistent with board policy and state law and disseminate them to all employees.

- 1 Students may be detained before or after the school day as a means of disciplinary action.
- 2 The following guidelines shall be followed:
  - 3 1. The student shall be given at least one (1) day of notice before detention;
  - 4 2. Parents shall be informed before detention takes place;
  - 5 3. Students in detention shall be under the supervision of school personnel;
  - 6 4. Detention shall not exceed one (1) hour after the official closing of the school day but may be
  - 7 administered several days in succession; and
  - 8 5. Teachers must have the approval of the principal before detaining a student.

9 **All due process procedures must be followed:**

- 10 **1. The student shall be informed of the charge.**
- 11 **2. The student shall give his/her account.**
- 12 **3. A written record shall be kept.**
- 13 **4. The student's parent/guardian shall be notified.**

- 1 The board may deny admission of any student (except those in state custody) who has been expelled or  
2 suspended from another school system in Tennessee or another state even though the student has  
3 established residency in the system in which he/she seeks enrollment.
- 4 After a request for enrollment is made, the director of schools **or his/her designee** shall investigate the  
5 facts surrounding the suspension/expulsion from the former school system, and **the director of schools**  
6 **shall** make a recommendation to the board to approve or deny the request.
- 7 The board shall not deny enrollment beyond the length of the imposed suspension/expulsion.
- 8 If the action of the board is to deny admission, the director of schools shall, on behalf of the board,  
9 notify the Commissioner of Education of the decision.
- 10 A student may be dismissed if it is determined subsequent to the enrollment that the student has been  
11 suspended or expelled from the former school system.<sup>1</sup>
